DRINKING WATER TESTING & DRINKING WATER FIXTURE SIGNAGE

Ontario is continuing to protect children's health with new regulation changes aimed at improving drinking water testing in child care centres and schools to minimize children's exposure to lead.



New amendments to Ontario Regulation 243/07 that took effect July 1, 2017, now require lead testing within these facilities for all fixtures used to provide drinking water and/or prepare food or drink for children under 18. There is a three-year period to test at elementary schools and child care centres, and a five-year period to complete testing at secondary schools.

Ontario Regulation 243/07 also requires testing to measure the presence of lead in drinking water against the provincial drinking water quality standard of 10 micrograms per litre, based on a national guideline set by Health Canada.

As we go through testing each year at Allan Greenleaf School you may notice stickers around certain sinks in the school. Any water fixture that is meant to provide water for consumption or for food preparation will be clearly labelled with a sign illustrating that the water is provided for drinking purposes. Water fountains will not have these signs as their intended purpose is for drinking.


FOOD WITH GRACE

SMOKING ON SCHOOL PROPERY

As part of the Ontario Tobacco Act, we must remind our com-



munity several times per year that there is no smoking permitted anywhere on school property. This includes the school parking lot and all playground areas. Please ensure

that you dispose of your lit cigarette before entering onto school property.

Thank you for your co-operation with this Municipal by-law.

SNOW CLEARING AND SALTING OF SCHOOL PROPERTY

Staff from the Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board will clear, salt and/or sand the following areas:



- The walkways from the City sidewalk to the school
- The school steps
- Ramps to schools
- An area outside of entrances and Fire Exit Doors
- Fire Exit stairs and ramps

When there is an accumulation of 5 cm of snow, parking lots and sidewalks are plowed by approved contractors arranged through Facilities Management. General salting and sanding of the parking lot is also done by contracted staff prior to the commencement of the school day when deemed necessary by the Facility Management staff. Head Caretakers may salt or sand isolated areas on the parking lot on an as needed basis.

COLD WEATHER AND OUTDOOR PLAY

Time spent outdoors is an integral part of the school day. Children benefit from fresh air and exercise.



With the Canadian climate, time spent outside could mean anything from applying sunscreen to donning extra mittens and a hat, depending on the season. In the winter, it's important children come to school prepared for the cold. Boots, mittens or gloves and

hats should be worn and it's a good idea to provide extra mittens, socks, etc. in the event they are needed.

The City of Hamilton's Public Health and Community Services Department recommends individuals stay indoors when the temperature drops below minus 15 degrees Celsius without wind chill.

SNOWBALLS

As the snow season begins full force, we must remind all of our students about the dangers of throwing snowballs. In ensuring that all of our students are safe at all times we must insist on the age old rule of NO SNOWBALLS at any time.



If parents could please review this important rule with their children at home it would be most appreciated.

CANCELLATION OF SCHOOL & BOARD ADMINISTRATIVE OPERATIONS

The decision to cancel School and Board Administrative Opera-



tions is often a difficult call to make. Please be assured that the decision to remain open or to close is always made with the safety and security of our students and staff in mind. In the event of inclement weather, our Transportation

Department advises our carriers to drive predetermined routes to assess the condition of the roads. This is done between 4:00 a.m. and 5:00 a.m. The drivers report back to the carriers and HWDSB begins to receive reports between 5:30 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. In the meantime, our Transportation Department is verifying the weather forecast through our local media outlets as well as contacting the City of Hamilton Works Department to determine where possible what roads have been cleared or when they are expected to be serviced. The decision to close our schools is made in conjunction with our colleagues at the Hamilton-Wentworth Catholic District School Board based on relevant information at that time. School Boards across Ontario have varying polices about the cancellation of schools. At HWDSB, the cancellation of transportation is linked to the can-

cellation of School and Board Administrative Operations. The cancellation of transportation immediately triggers the closure of our schools. For more information on the Cancellation of School and Board Administrative Operation, please check the Board website. The HWDSB

has a voice-activated message system that allows the Board to send out messages to all students in the School Board. On days when the decision is made to close schools due to unsafe weather, the System will send out a telephone message to every household in the school. Please remember, as a parent/guardian you always have the choice on whether or not to send your child to school.

Please <u>do not</u> phone the school to ask if schools are open as when schools are closed there is no staff at school to answer telephones.



PLAYGROUNDS WILL NOT BE PLOWED OR OTHERWISE CLEARED.

Head Caretakers will check the condition of the grounds early in the morning and during the school day to sand and/or salt isolated slippery areas that may occur due to



changing temperatures. Students should take extra caution when walking onto and leaving from school grounds. Caution must also be taken when playing on school grounds when conditions are slippery. Principals may decide, dependent on weather and playground conditions, to have indoor recess and nutrition breaks.
