



PRINCIPALS MESSAGE

Recent research has strongly indicated that children whose parents engage them in educational activities tend to do better in school. Families have a major influence on their children's achievement in school and throughout life. When schools, families and the community work together to support learning, children tend to do better in school, like school and stay in school longer. As documented, the three most important family influences on student achievement are:

- 1. Students' and parents' expectations for academic performance
- 2. The extent to which parents are engaged in support activities
- 3. Students' attitudes toward effort as a necessity to success.

Parents who instil a solid work ethic and the importance of education most certainly contribute to their child's success in school and their future. Parents need to be role models of character education so our child understands the morals and values we deem so important. Parents should serve as teachers in the home.

Set aside time every evening for your child to complete homework. That homework might be work not finished at school, assignment completion or test preparation. It could also involve reading to and with your children and then asking comprehension questions. You're not supposed to do their work for them but it is quite beneficial to instruct them, provide suggestions or revisions. Memorizing multiplication tables is not outdated. Model the importance of education.

SCHOOL ORGANIZATION FOR 2018-2019

At the end of April, we will receive our school organization according to our projected school enrolment. This information will be shared in our last newsletter on the last day of school in June. Please be aware that even once this is shared, things can change. The reason for this is that staffing of schools takes place late in the school year. Over the summer, a school can lose a teacher to retirement, leave of absence, maternity leave or physical move. Sometimes a loss or increase of students over the summer requires us to move students into another class to balance numbers.

Next month, teachers will be meeting in order to "place" students for next year. Our staff spends a tremendous amount of time and energy creating class lists. Staff teams collaborate to create these lists. They review social, emotional and academic development. In addition, they consider learning styles, the number of males and females, balancing academic performance and leadership skills, which students need to be together, and who needs to be separated. As teachers differentiate instruction on a daily basis, requests to have students removed from split classes will not be granted. Any other parental requests/concerns regarding student placement <u>must</u> be put in writing and submitted to the office before **May 11th**. Only requests that are made for "sound educational reasons" will be considered. Parental input **does not** include "lobbying" for a class, and/or a particular teacher. Please note that any input

received after **May 11th** will <u>not</u> be considered, as we are attempting to make all class placement decisions before the end of this school year, in order to allow us to get off to a smooth start in September.



Waiting until after school starts to ask for changes is very disruptive to all concerned and therefore all requests at that time will be denied unless a reorganization of classes takes place.

We thank you for your patience and support as we work through this process.
