Secure Schools

Although one can never predict when a violent or potentially harmful situation may arise, schools can prepare for responding to such an incident through intentional, scheduled practices. The goal of the practices is to minimize the risk for staff and students during a time of crisis. Like at all HWDSB schools, at Balaclava we hold Fire, Hold & Secure, Shelter in Place, Lockdown, and Evacuation/Bomb Threat drills each year.

"Fire" is used in the event of smoke or fire in or around the school.

• Follow current evacuation procedures (the fire alarm will sound, teachers will lead their classes out of the school in a quiet, calm manner)

"Hold and Secure" is used if the school is secured due to an ongoing situation outside and not related to the school (e.g. bank robbery near a school).

- the school continues to function normally, with the exterior doors locked until the situation is resolved
- staff members posted at each entrance restrict all movement in and out of the school
- where possible, exterior facing windows will be covered or blinds drawn, and lights dimmed
- the school would most likely to be notified by Hamilton Police Services

****Shelter In Dlace**** is used for an environmental, or weather related situation, where it is necessary to keep all occupants within the school to protect them (e.g., chemical spills, extreme weather conditions)

- people enter and remain in the building with the doors and windows closed
- fans, heating/air conditioning units are turned off to prevent air from outside entering the building
- normal operations may continue within the building

****Lockdown**^{**} is used if there is a major incident or threat of school violence within the school, or in relation to the school. The threat is inside the school, or on school property, and poses an immediate threat to students and staff

- follow current lockdown procedures (blinds closed, door locked, lights off, everyone is quiet/out of sight)
- all movement in and out of the school and within the school is restricted

****Bomb Threat/Evacuation**** is used if a bomb threat is received, an explosive device is reported or discovered, or an explosives incident takes place.

• Follow current evacuation procedures (teachers will lead their classes out of the school in a quiet, calm manner)

In the event of a "real" situation, the Hamilton Police Services/Hamilton Fire Department would also be responding to the situation.

At Balaclava we have already been practising with 3 fire drills in September. We will hold three in the spring. Over the next months we will also be practicing the other types of drills. <u>Staff, students, and parents will be given prior notice</u> <u>of Bomb Threat drills and Lockdown drills</u>. Along with practices at school, we encourage parents/guardians to talk with their children about the importance of being well prepared for emergency situations. Reassure your child that:

- these drills, like fire drills, are just to practice how to stay safe in the extremely unlikely event that someone dangerous enters the school.
- the adults at school work together to keep them safe
- practising means we are prepared and can feel confident that we all know what to do just in case.
- having a plan like this and practicing means that we don't have to worry about these concerns and instead we can focus on having fun and learning at school.

Balaclava Staff remind the students of these points as well. We talk about all the things that we do to keep safe at school and that practising certain drills help us to know what to do if an unsafe situation happens. Students understand that for a fire drill we need to leave the building, while during a lockdown drill we practice staying safe in our classrooms.

For most students, especially the youngest ones, the language above will be sufficient. However, as students get older they may ask specific questions, speculate about the reasons for such a drill, or share some knowledge with the teacher about situations that have happened elsewhere. Teachers will re-direct to the language above (e.g., practising means that we should feel confident that we're prepared) and not encourage more discussion on the "what-ifs". If it seems necessary, a teacher in the younger grades may use an example such as: if a large animal that shouldn't be inside came into our school, we would stay safe in our classroom until the experts could come and take it where it belongs.

EQAO 2017

Every year Grade 3, 6, 9 and 10 students across the province of Ontario write a variety of EQAO assessments in Reading, Writing, and Mathematics. Although these grades actually write the tests, preparation for these assessments is a whole school activity.

Skills learned in Kindergarten are built upon in the primary years in preparation for the Primary assessment in Grade 3. The results of this assessment are used by the Junior teachers as they identify areas in need of further development as their students work towards the Junior assessment at the end of Grade 6.

Last year our students in Grades 3 and 6 once again participated in the Primary and Junior Assessments. The following charts summarizes last spring's results:

E.Q.A.O. results of individual students who wrote the assessment last year will be sent home with students later this month.

It is important to remember that E.Q.A.O. results are a snapshot of our student's abilities during one week of the year. During the assessment teachers are not permitted to assist or even prompt their students. Thus marks on report cards tend to be slightly higher as they represent work completed over a term with the opportunity for additional instruction and practice to improve final results. E.Q.A.O. results are analyzed by the school staff to provide information on where our students find success and where they need additional instruction, support or review. Homework Help - Grade 7-10

Did you know that students in grades 7 to 10 have free access to online math homework help? Homework help is run by TVO's Independent Learning Centre with support from the Ontario government.

Students can log in Sunday-Thursday (5:30 p.m. - 9:30 p.m.) for free one-on-one tutoring. Students can also join their grade's tutor room to see what questions other students are asking and then watch teachers walk through problems on the group whiteboard.

Additionally, Homework Help's Student Resources (which have been created in partnership with Ontario educators) are available 24/7. Students can review and learn new math concepts at their own pace through "Best Sessions", Interactive Tutorials and Listen & Learns.

To log in and register, students will need their Ontario Education Number (OEN).

Head Lice - Pediculosis

Head lice (pediculosis) occurs from time to time in each school. <u>Anyone can get head lice</u>. School children get lice more than adults. When children play, their heads often touch. Lice crawl from head to head. Head lice are spread by direct contact only (e.g. head to head, shared clothing).

Help us reduce the spread of head lice. Please check your children on a regular basis and if you do find that your child has head lice, **please inform the school**. Your child will never be identified to other parents. An approved treatment (such as Nix, R&C Shampoo, or Resultz) must be used before your child returns to school. Consult with Bug Busters, your pharmacist, or other medical practitioner about the best product to use.
