

GETTING UP FOR SCHOOL A hassle for every family.



Just 2 little letters, an N and an O, make up one very powerful word. It can stop a person in their tracks, it can change a course of action, it can deny requests, it can signal that something is unwanted, and much more. How one says 'no' often determines how it is received. Teaching appropriate refusals, and the appropriate use of the word 'no' can help our students become self-advocates, and can often help avoid behaviours. There are a variety of 'no's that can be taught including:



"The hardest part about teaching 'no' is the balance between teaching, encouraging and reinforcing an appropriate 'no', and not teaching, encouraging or reinforcing challenging behaviours. It may help to start by staging situations: introduce an undesired situation, and present the 'no' that will be used at the same time. Model the use of 'no', and assist and encourage them to do the same. Take it slowly, and let your child learn that once they tell you 'no' appropriately, it will be honoured and situations will change. As time goes on, fade the support, or have them find the way they say 'no'. You can also take advantage of unplanned opportunities. Notice their 'pre-no' behaviours such as agitation or waning attention, and instead of asking 'do you need a break?' provide a 'no' model and encourage them to copy it.

It may also help your child to 'think-aloud' to model the use of 'no' in daily situations. When presented with something you would say 'no' to (such as a cookie you don't want, the gift of a worm, an ill-timed or ill-placed kiss) speak your thoughts "Do I want this? Not really..." and model the use of 'no' that you are encouraging your child to use. Once your child has the basic 'no' down, you can then expand on 'no' to things like 'no thanks' or 'no I don't like that' using similar strategies.

Here are some controlled staged activities you can do to elicit a 'no' that you can model without creating a possibly challenging situation.

Offer undesired food choices Offer undesired toys Offer undesired books Provide a sensory situation the child does not prefer Offer inappropriate clothing for the weather Provide incorrect information (wrong name for student or yourself, wrong age etc) This resource was put together by Janelle Vedder, from ALI materials written and curated by Carole Zangari and Robin Parker, SLPs and AAC specialists who write the blog PrAACtical AAC.







From Glenwood Library
