With the end of the school year fast approaching I would just like to reflect on some of the awesome gains and moments we have experienced with Jesse and our students.



A big thank you to Shazia and Janelle for helping with social stories to support the pet therapy visits.



If your child wandered away from home, or from you in the grocery store or the mall, would they be able to tell someone who found them who to call?

If you and your child were in a car accident, would they be able to explain to first responders their name, or who they should call?

In times of stress it is often difficult for many of our Glenwood students to convey important information to first responders and people who are wanting to provide assistance.

One solution to this is to provide our children with bracelets containing important information so that people can read the information instead of relying on our students varied communication skills.

RoadId.com is a company that has created bracelet products to contain important information for runners and cyclists who are training alone in case of medical emergency, first responders can read the information on their wrists.

The rubber band of their WristID Slim (<a href="https://www.roadid.com/p/the-Wrist-ID-Slim">https://www.roadid.com/p/the-Wrist-ID-Slim</a>) model is comfortable, non-irritating, and durable. They also come in a variety of sizes. The five lines of information you can put on the badge is customizable to your children.
