${f T}$ echnology in Room 14!

Students in Room 14 use **iPad technology** in many functional ways. During instructional Teaching Time activities the iPad is an engaging learning tool. Students develop and practise fine motor, matching, letter formation, keyboard and writing skills using the **Bits Board App**. The iPad has become a key component to enhance student communication skills using the **Proloque** program. The visual and technological supports allow all students to have their own voice to make requests for what they need or want. The students also use the iPad as a motivating, preferred activity when they can just enjoy music or games. It is great to see independence in our students through the use of technology while learning educational, communication and leisure skills.

${f T}$ echnology in the Glenwood Apartment

Technology is highly embedded into the Life Skills/Leisure program in the Glenwood Apartment. Students benefit in several ways from the use of technology:

Switches are used to control the operation of kitchen appliances such as mixers, food processors, peelers and blenders

IPads are used to take videos of students performing life skills. These can be used to show progress to parents and also to provide feedback to staff in terms of how we can support students better with and without our prompts.

The **SMART Board** is used to provide students with music choice boards as a form of leisure.

We are working with the Board's 21st Century Team to continue to build on these great resources to support our students learning.

$\mathbf P$ utting the ART back in SMART Board!

Through my teaching career, I have often seen the SMART Board become a glorified projector screen. Having one in our room meant that we had to get creative in the ways we use it. Our **SMART Board** is used regularly in morning routine for the calendar, weather and attendance. Some of our students also use this technology to create art. A recent favourite is *Silk* - *Interactive Generative Art* where our students can use their hand or pointer stick to generate colourful silk strands on a black background. Not only is this a good use of fine/gross motor skills for the artist, but it is relaxing for those watching. One of our students in particular gets very engaged and can be seen (even heard!) pressing on the SMART Board and moving his hand all over the screen. In that moment, he is an artist focused not on nearby dangling cables or a pile of papers...but on his art and the colours he is creating.

${f T}$ echnology Corner

All students in our class use the **Sounding Board** program on the **iPad** as part of their visual schedule and to assist with transitions between activities. So for example, we show them the photo of the next activity we are going to do (e.g. SMART board, Art, etc). For one of our students who is new to Canada from Syria in the past couple of years, we have built in Arabic and English words into the program to help her learn English by associating the word with her first language. We can tell by the smile on her face with some of the pictures and words she hears that she understands what activity is next.

Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) can look different for each individual student. At Glenwood we use different kinds of AAC technology to help give our students a voice. Some of the high tech devices used at Glenwood include **iPads** and our newest addition; **My Gaze**. Currently students use My Gaze as a training tool to strengthen the use of their eyes in order to build skills that will eventually help them navigate a communication system. These skills include accessing all areas of the screen, clicking on targets, tracking objects, and building stamina. As this is a very physically and mentally taxing activity, we are proud of the hard work our students in Room 2, 3, and 4 have put into their My Gaze activities.
