<u>HWDSB – We Help</u>

At HWDSB, we are building a culture of help seeking and help offering in our schools and departments. This renewed commitment will take the form of a campaign titled We Help.

We know that students who struggle will first reach out to their friends or peers, not formal leaders like teachers and principals.

We want everyone in our system – especially youth who are the peers of those who are struggling – to know that they can help. We want students to learn how to recognize when someone is upset, what to do to help and how and when to involve an adult.

Here at Green Acres, staff will be introduced to We Help, the concept of what it is and how we will introduce We Help to our students at our next staff meeting. We Help Letters will be going home with students so all parents are aware of idea of WE-Help.

Grade 4-8 MDI Survey

Over the past year, our community, families, students, staff and administrators have told us that we need to gather data specific to mental health and well-being. In response, and to support the HWDSB Mental Health Strategy, HWDSB has partnered with the Human Early Learning Partnership (HELP) at the University of British Columbia. This partnership allows HWDSB to use the Middle Years Development Instrument (MDI) to measure student wellbeing across five holistic dimensions:

- 1) Social and emotional development, such as self-esteem, optimism, happiness and empathy;
- 2) Feelings of connectedness to school, family, friends and communities;
- 3) School experiences (climate)
- 4) Physical health and wellbeing; and
- 5) Time use after school hours, as well as children's wishes for their after -school time

Letters will be going home explaining the grade 4-8 MDI Survey, teachers will be introduced to the MDI survey, how to administer the survey to their classes at the April 19th staff meeting. There are 2 survey's Grade 4 – grade 4,5,6 students take, Grade 7 – grade 7 & 8 take, students do not have to take part, each student will have their own unique identifier number, data from the survey will be kept secure, protected and separate within HWDSB Research & Analytical Department apart from other data warehouses at HWDSB
