members, between neighbours and friends, and even between our foes. The audience is taught the significance of tradition to communities, and how it is always changing through the



To them, this event meant more than just raising money or racing in the climb. It is true when they say cancer has affected every person in some way. In support of all those who have been through the struggle of living with cancer, many schools and students in the Hamilton Wentworth board have participated in this event with tremendous fundraising efforts.

Brian Humphrey, a fitness consultant, experienced first-hand what it was like to lose someone in his life to cancer. When one of his clients was diagnosed, he watched her go through all the stages of her sickness. He helped her through all the pain and suffering, but even then he could not save her. Her story and legacy was what inspired him to begin this project. Humphrey compared the battle against cancer to that of climbing a mountain. The vision and goal of the "Climb for Cancer" was to bring family and community members together to support those with cancer who are climbing their own mountains. Every year since 2007, Hamiltonians have gathered with determination, spirit and courage to climb the Chedoke Stairs, breaking records every year for money raised and steps climbed. Over the past eight years, a total of \$400,000 has been collected.

For weeks, these twenty students from grades nine to twelve tirelessly collected pledges from family members, friends and teachers to support this amazing cause. With a goal of \$2,000, they easily challenged that by raising a grand total of \$2,314. Come the day of the climb, the students were buzzing with anticipation. Arriving at the Chedoke stairs, they laced up their running shoes and put on faces of determination. As soon as the buzzer hit, they were off; for an entire hour they would climb 289 steps up the Niagara escarpment. At the end, the students were dripping with sweat with legs achingly numb and hearts pounding. All together the students climbed 46,241 steps. That would be the equivalent to scaling Mount Everest almost twice.

They day went on with more schools participating every hour. Waterdown's own Joey Braeden held the record for the day with 4,624 steps reached. The event not only brought awareness to the cause, but it also challenges people to push themselves and to support those around them affected by cancer. It was an inspirational experience for all those who participated and every contribution made a difference in the constant climb to beat cancer.
