#### **PREDICTING**

Good readers think about what's going to happen and make predictions based on what they know and what they have read.

## Prompts to use as you read with your child at home:

- What are you guessing this will be about?
- What do you think will happen next?
- What is your guess...?
- From the author's clues, what do you think?

### Questioning

Good readers ask themselves questions when they read.

# Prompts to use as you read with your child at home:

- What do you think the author is trying to tell you?
- Why is ...happening?
- Why did the character....?
- What does this make you wonder?
- Can this be right?
- Do you agree/disagree?

### Making Connections

Good readers connect
what they already
know with what they
are reading. They
connect in 3 different
ways:
Text to text
Text to self
Text to world

# Prompts to use as you read with your child at home:

- Does this remind you of something?
- Has this ever happened to you?
- Do you know another story like this one?
- Have you felt this way?

#### VISUALIZING

Good readers picture what is happening while they read.

# Prompts to use as you read with your child at home:

- What did this description help you to see in your mind?
- Could you imagine...?
- When you close your eyes, what do you see?
- What do you hear, taste, smell, see or feel as you read this?
- Can you picture this new information?

### **Inferring**

Good readers use what they know (schema) and what they read in the text to make a conclusion.

## Prompts to use as you read with your child at home:

- What do you think the author is really saying here?
- What does this clue lead you to believe?
- When you read between the lines, what do you know the author is telling you?
- Can you take ideas from the text and add your own ideas?

### Determining Important Ideas

Good readers
determine the
difference between
what they need to
know and what is
interesting. This is used
a lot in non-fiction.

### Prompts to use as you read with your child at home:

- Why do you think this is important and why?
- What does the change in font or font size mean...?
- Do you think the author was for or against this idea?
- What should you remember?
