




Family Literacy Day January 27th

KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION

Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board (HWDSB) schools are exciting, enriching places where children learn to explore the world, solve problems and make friends. Your child is eligible for the two-year kindergarten program in the calendar year that they turn four or five. Registration starts each year on the first Monday in February (February 5th) at your home school. Visit Find My School to find your home school.

Cold Weather & Outdoor Play

Time spent outdoors is an integral part of the school day. Children need fresh air and exercise that time spent outside affords.

With the Canadian climate, time spent outside could mean anything from applying sunscreen to donning extra mittens and a hat, depending on the season. In the winter it is important children come to school prepared for the cold. Boots, mittens or gloves and hats should be worn to school and it is a good idea to provide extra mittens, socks, etc. in the event they are needed.

As always, Principals can use their judgment in determining whether or not students remain inside during recess given the weather conditions.

However, the City of Hamilton's Public Health and Community Services department recommends individuals stay indoors when the temperature drops below minus 15 degrees Celsius without wind chill. Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board asks principals to follow this recommendation and ensure children are not outside when it is that cold.

From time to time we do get major storms that do force the closure of school and board administrative operations due to inclement weather. Announcements are generally made around 6am and the best practice is to check the HWDSB webpage or watch and listen to local media for up-to-date information on the cancellation of events or operations.

Parking, Dropping Off and Idling Vehicles

Our families and community have responded well to our request to honour the NO STOPPING area in the front of the school this year. However, with the winter weather we are noticing an increase in people stopping their cars in this area to drop students off. Please remember to park the car in a designated parking spot and walk your child over to the school using the clearly marked crosswalk. The area in front of the school is a NO STOP-PING zone.
