Canada Huawei CFO Arrested

Meng Wanzhou, the Chief Financial Officer of Chinese-based tech giant Huawei, was arrested on December 1 by Canadian officials in Vancouver, under claims made by the US government that she had allegedly covered up violations of sanctions placed on Iran.

Although the request for Meng's arrest had been issued by an American judge in August, she was not arrested until this month, and a press ban kept the details of the case secretive until now. Meng was detained on accounts of believing to have told financial institutions that a subsidiary of Huawei was a separate company, thus sidestepping US sanctions.

Many believe that this arrest is another sharp crack in the delicate balance of China-USA relations currently, especially with it coming right after President Donald Trump and President Xi Jinping reached a truce in their trade war. China has already responded with condemnation, calling for Meng's release, and recently, former Canadian diplomat Michael Kovrig was detained in China, under endangering Chinese national accusations of security. One editorial in the Chinese state-owned newspaper the Global Times, claimed that Meng was arrested in order to damage Huawei's reputation, ability and obstruct its to compete in American-dominated tech markets.

Time Magazine has named Jamal Khashoggi, a Saudi Arabian journalist who was a well-known critic of his country's government, as well as many other imprisoned, threatened and murdered journalists, including the Capital Gazette, Maria Ressa, Wa Lone and Kyaw Soe Oo, as its Person of the Year.

Khashoggi, an outspoken critic of the Saudi government, was murdered some 2 months ago by a government hit team, after entering an consulate and never reappearing. It is believed his body was cut up, and later dissolved in acid. Saudi Arabia faces international condemnation for the killings.

Among the others recognized include Maria Ressa, the founder of Filipino online news site Ressler in 2012. The site's journalism license was taken away, after revealing that President Rodrigo Duerte was suspected to have used Facebook bots to spread his message during the election. Wa Lone and Kyaw Soe Oo are 2 Reuters journalists, sentenced to prison for 7 years while investigating the mass murders of 10 Rohyinga men. The Capital Gazette is a newspaper in Annapolis, Maryland, which was the site of a mass shooting in which 5 of its staff were murdered by a gunman upset by old coverage about him.

This year's Person of the Year recognized the journalists and truth-seekers - what Time Magazine referred to as the "Guardians", and those who face significant risks in order to report and investigate the truth. According to many sources, about 90% of plastic in Canada is not recycled, meaning that we really need to step up. All of this excess recycling ends up in landfills, oceans, and lakes, which is a tremendous hazard to wildlife. Plastic can cause marine life many troubles, such as suffocation and digestive problems. So what can we do? A couple simple solutions are to cut as



#ThisIsNotConsent

n recent news, there has been an outbreak of protests surrounding the hashtag #ThisIsNotConsent. This hashtag has been used on various social media platforms to remind people that an individual's clothing choices, and more specifically, lingerie choices, are not reasonable arguments or evidence that they consent to any sexual acts.

In Scotland in 2001, a 17-year-old female, Lindsay Armstrong, was a victim of rape by a 15-year-old male. The case was taken to trial in 2002, whe-



Lindsay Armstrong was just 17 years old when she was raped. The underwear she wore on that day was cited as evidence of consent in her trial. She committed suicide 2 weeks later. re the rape victim was forced to hold up her underwear in court. She was then told to read the words that were printed on the front of her underwear, which read: 'Little Devil'. The lawyer of the accused argued that the underwear she was wearing suggested that she consented to the sex that occurred between the two parties. Two weeks after the trial, Lindsay Armstrong took her own life.

Last month on November 6th, a 27-year-old male was accused of raping a 17-year-old Northern Ireland. girl in Prosecutors said she was dragged into a muddy alleyway and raped by this man, who claims that she gave him consent. As the trial proceeded, defense attorney Elizabeth O'Connell suggested the victim was lying about giving consent, and said that she may have been attracted to the man. She asked the jury to consider the underwear worn by the female at the time of the rape, just like what occurred in the 2001 Armstrong case.

O'Connell said herself that: "[the victim] was wearing a thong with a lace front" ... But what was her point? Yes, women wear thongs. Some like lace, some do not, but does that detail mean that women who wear a certain type of fabric automatically give consent? It does not, and it should not. Clothing choices do not determine an individual's choice to consent. Your voice does, your actions do, but not the pieces of clothing you choose to wear everyday. Why is a type of fabric sexualized in a way that justifies why a young woman was sexually assaulted?

What aggravates me the most is the people who take this topic lightly, or simply just take it as a joke. What if a case like this happened to you or someone close to you? Cases like these happen more often than people think or know, and it is necessary for the public to be aware of these instances. The more people who know, and the more people who make the choice to support the victims and not the rapists, then the bigger the movement becomes. Actions speak louder than words, and the only way we can solve this ongoing issue of excusing rapist based off of fashion choices is to stop ignoring the problem.

The Doug Ford government did not waste any time in getting back at Toronto for not voting for him in the 2014 mayoral election. This was shown by reducing the Toronto council from 47 seats to 25 seats during the municipal election. Of course, the reasoning behind this change was based under the pretenses of saving the taxpayers money (\$25 million supposedly), but it didn't. Normally, there would be a procedure to reduce the number of council members, but Doug said screw that and used the Notwithstanding Clause, a loophole in our democracy that allows the premier to override the constitution whenever they want; think executive order down in the states.

There is also the controversial move to promote a family friend, the under-qualified Ron Trevor as OPP. If you don't understand the severity of this move, please consult every country whose leader elected family friends into power.

Next, is the Hydro One, capitalism's unfortunate consequence. Hydro One was said to purchase a US utility company but because the government meddled with a mostly private company, the deal was broken by a regulator, costing \$185 million.

r. Perkins is one of the many devoted math teachers at Ancaster High School and is adored by his current and former students. He changes his students' attitudes towards math through the involvement of real-life situations within the math curriculum. Mr. Perkins has been teaching at Ancaster High School for 8 years. Throughout those years, he has committed his time to helping students become successful at math and Alternative Education, as well as being involved with the Ancaster High Golf Team.

Q: What classes do you teach at Ancaster High School?

A: MCV4U, MDM4U, MFM1P, MPM1D, MPM2D, MFM2P, MCR3U, MBF3C, MHF4U, alt-Ed .

Q: What inspired you to become a teacher?

A: "I liked math in highschool but it was boring, like super boring. I originally wanted to be an engineer, I had to go back for an extra year to take an algebra geometry course that wasn't offered in my grade 12 year, and so that I wasn't just taking one class they let me take peer tutoring. So I peer tutored for a grade 9 applied math class and I loved it."

What has rehearsal been like for you?

Bohemian Rhapsody, a biographical film on the rock band Queen, was released on October 23 of 2018. The movie

has grossed approximately 596 million dollars on a production budget of approximately 50 million dollars, making it one of the top ten grossing films of the year worldwide.

The movie has had mixed reviews from critics and viewers, but one common theme was the praise for Rami Malek's performance as Freddie Mercury. As a viewer myself, I can tell you about the movie from a highschool students perspective.

The film portrays this spiral as the fault of Paul Prenter, Mercury's lover and former manager. Although disagree with people this portrayal of Paul, I believe that, although it is villainizing, it gave the story a complex antagonist that fit the plot and provided a divergence to other characters. In conclusion, Bohemian Rhapsody is a great film, and it is definitely worth seeing, whether you know the band, or are just looking for something to watch. 

Essential Tips for Exam Success

students, especially for for students that have not taken an exam before and for those that struggle with time management and remembering material. With exams accounting for a high weightage of students' overall mark, there can be a high amount of pressure on students for the best possible outcome. That being said, exams are manageable as long as students are proactive with their preparation. Here are some beneficial tips to help you succeed this exam season.

Starting Early

Giving yourself enough time to thoroughly grasp concepts throughout learned the semester is crucial. Studying over a long period of time makes the information part of your long term memory and will make easier for you to recall the material during your exam. Cramming all the information into a span of a couple of days can be easily lost and hard to trace during a stressful situation such as an exam. 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
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
