#### Indigenous Well-Being: Reconciling our roles as treaty partners

November 3rd-9th marks an important day in our journey towards reconciliation. It is Treaties Recognition week. This time is intended to honour the importance of our relationships with Indigenous Peoples. Treaties were agreements that existed before the arrival of settlers. The agreements, made sure that each nation understood the customs of others, their territories and their laws. Indigenous Peoples entered treaty negotiations with Settler Peoples. Indigenous Peoples used the treaties to communicate over the use of the land and its resources. The Settler view on land was that it could be owned and given to others. Many Canadians believe that treaties are a thing of the past, but treaties made in the past remain legally-binding agreements. At Billy Green, we consistently acknowledge the land and resources we share. As a community, it is imperative that we lead in understanding our relationships by listening to First Nations, Inuit and Métis through their own voices, by reading books, watching films or listening to music created by Indigenous People.

For this reason, students will only be permitted to watch a game if accompanied by an adult. As always, thank you for your cooperation.

#### Equity and Human Rights Corner

Billy Green continues its commitment to equity and human rights through curriculum and instruction. We recognize that the school is a microcosm of society whereby the incidences of bias, hate or prejudice that occur at school reflect a smaller proportion of the reality of these instances in the greater community. A common phrase we hear at school is "snitches get stiches". This phrase intimidates students from reporting instances that they feel and know are unjust. As the adults in the school, we model our responsibility to stop and address acts of bias, hate or prejudice by **interrupting** (ie That comment is not ok!), **identifying** (ie The word you said is racist, transphobic etc), **explaining** and supporting. It is important that we as a community work to stop the belief that telling someone about an incident will lead to harm to the individual who tells. Collective conversations at school and home is one approach to break the silence where "snitches" DO NOT get stitches. At home, consider talking to your child about what it means to report and how they can report to an adult in the school confidentially.
