ABOUT CENTRAL SCHOOL

Central Public School was opened in 1853 to accommodate 1,000 students in the largest graded school in Upper Canada. Central was the first public school in Hamilton. It incorporated a scheme of an integrated, rational and graduated public education system based upon a central school and primary feeders. The original building is a finely proportioned classical design. It was remodelled in 1890 to include a steeply pitched roof, round-arched windows and a heightened central tower. It was remodelled in 1934 when the clock was installed. Presently, our school population represents 30 nations from around the world, with approximately 29 languages other than English spoken at home.

ABOUT KINDERGARTEN AT CENTRAL



At Central School there are 5
Kindergarten classrooms that all could have **TWO** educators (Registered Early Childhood Educator and Ontario Certified Teacher). Both educators bring unique skills to the classroom that together play a vital role in educating your children and running a successful play-based inquiry program.

WHAT DOES A DAY IN KINDERGARTEN LOOK LIKE?

Every classroom will look a little bit different and have its own schedule, but a day in Kindergarten will have a variety of engaging learning activities that the teacher and DECE create for students, based on their interests and learning goals.

A typical day includes:

- A morning carpet routine
- Daily read-aloud stories
- Table top activities where students make a choice from a selection of activities of their interest
- Blocks of play
- Building challenges
- Sensory activities (water bin, play-doh etc.)
- Singing songs
- Several bathroom breaks
- Short, whole class lessons at the carpet
- 1:1 time with educators and small group instruction
- Blocks of outdoor play & exercise
- Visits to the gym & library on a weekly basis

WAYS TO BE KINDERGARTEN READY...



Many parents ask what their child needs to know before starting kindergarten. It is really a combination of many skills, behaviours and attitudes that determine each child's readiness for kindergarten. Each child's readiness will look very different. The following is a list that includes some skills that will make the transition to kindergarten successful for your child.

10 WAYS TO GET READY FOR K....

- Respects people and materials
 (Ready-to follow school and classroom rules, tries to solve problems appropriately, willing to share and cooperate with peers and educators)
- 2. Independently takes care of personal needs (asks to use the washroom, uses the washroom fully independently, cleans up after themselves, dresses themselves, uses tissues/Kleenex independently, can put on shoes and pack/unpack their own backpack including zippers)
- Follows Simple directions
 (Listens and responds when name is called, remembers what he/she is asked to do independently)
- Takes Turns
 (Shares toys and materials, is able to wait their turn)





5. Starting to Demonstrate Self Control

(Able to express emotions appropriately, and try new things, willing to participate in group experiences)

6. Respects Personal Space of themselves/others (Keeps hands and legs to themselves while playing and interacting in a

themselves while playing and interacting in a group)

7. Some Exposure to learning tools

(eg. scissors, glue sticks, paint as well as can hold a pencil, markers, crayons)

8. Recognizes Name, some letters and numbers

(This makes things a little easier for children when they are finding their own cubbies and belongings. As well recent research shows children who enter kindergarten knowing 8-10 letters and some numbers shows high success rates.)

9. Uses books properly

(handles books appropriately and understands how to turn pages properly)

Epici Reading (App & website)

Gives students independence in choosing their own books, some with "read aloud" features, songs, and videos. Educators can send students stories relevant to class learning. Educators and families can keep track of stories read in their individual accounts.

Teach Your Monster to Read (App & Website)

An award-winning series of games to develop literacy skills; covers letters/letter sounds, blending, segmenting, and reading sentences. Students create their own monster and play mini games, teaching him to read. You can use the class account, or on your own as well.

Little writer (App only)

Allows students to trace letters, numbers, shapes and words on their tabet to practice proper formation, and gain muscle memory. No account needed.




Book Creator (App only)


Allows students to create their own storybook with pictures and words, which can be saved and printed.

IS YOUR CHILD LANGUAGE READY FOR SCHOOL?

When your child is getting ready to start Junior Kindergarten this fall, help them get the best possible start in school. By age four, your child should:

- Follow simple directions with two or three steps (e.g.: Get your boots and hat and meet me at the front door)
- Pronounce words about the same way as others his/her age
- Be understood by people he/she doesn't know most of the time
- Speak in sentences that sound about the same as an adult's
- Use endings on words like dogs, jumped, or biking
- Play a pretend game and be able to describe it to you afterwards with enough detail for you to understand
- Be able to answer questions about a book you just read together

If your child is unable to do the things listed above, a speech-language pathologist should meet with your child.

In the Hamilton area, Early Words is a publicly funded organization that provides speech and language services to pre-school children. Please call Early Words at (905) 381-2828.

You must call this number to register your child before August 31, in order for your child to be eligible for services through his/her Junior Kindergarten year. There is no cost to parents.

You MUST call this number to register your child BEFORE August 31st in order for your child to be eligible for services through their Junior Kindergarten year. This is a free service provided for parents.


