#### **5.0 School Report** presented by Denise Minardi, Principal and is attached (Appendix A).

There was a question regarding a teacher that has been fired and the principal confirmed that this is not true. She mentioned that the vice-principle will be leaving, and the school expects to have a new vice-principle by January. This is a full-time position and but if HWDSB does not have an available qualified person in the vice principal pool they will post somebody to the position on a temporary basis. We have now had two temporary Vice Principals this year. We are hoping that we will have a permanent person soon.

# **6.3 Night Hike:** Presented by Heather Harvey

The event was financially a success, as the final amount raised for the Pumpkin Night Hike was \$7333 after expenses. From this, \$500 donated to Royal Botanical Gardens and Smiles Over Sickness (organized the games). There were some other successes aside from the amount raised – we had a large number of pumpkins, more then in recent years, the games organized by Smiles Over Sickness were very well done and glowstick sales were very strong. We did the same promotion as in previous years (Facebook event on our Facebook page, ads home with students), but numbers were significantly more than in previous years. We don't have an estimate on how many people were there.

There were some issues due to overwhelming response, helped by good weather, changes to how Facebook promotes events and the similar RBG event selling out quickly. These issues were around crowds on the trail, having to wait to do the hike, parking, lines in the washroom and running out of tissues. However, no official complaints were brought to RBG or the school to our knowledge.

The goal moving forward is to balance our communities' enjoyment of the hike with raising money. An ad hoc committee will be meeting to put together a proposal of how to deal with this next year. Bobbi Duncan and Allison Henderson have volunteered to join. Other volunteers are welcome. This group will meet 2-3 times between January and April.

There was a discussion about the estimate for number of people who attended. Heather suggested that based on the money collected and the length of the event, there might be 1500 persons.

There was also a question regarding where the pumpkins go for the event, Heather mentioned that they are picked up by the City waste collection that night. People who are interested can take their own pumpkins home. There was mention of coordinating with a local farm that collects pumpkins to feed their pigs, which can be explored in future years. It is key that the pumpkins are picked up that night or their end up smashed by the next morning.

# **6.4 Lunch Clubs**: Presented by Erin Lepischak

Thanks to Andrea Ara and Haley Weber for sorting the lunch club forms and creating club lists. There were 13 clubs to choose from. We have 138 students participating in the clubs, plus many additional students participating in the school choirs.

We would like to run more clubs in the spring.

#### **6.5 Magazine fundraiser**: Presented by Erin Lepischak

Thanks to Sharon Kang for running this fundraiser. Total sales were \$6135.00, and our profit is \$1840.50. Parents can still purchase magazine subscriptions online.

### 6.6 Upcoming events:

i. <u>Holiday Concert Bake Sale:</u> Presented by Lynda Brewer Scheduled for December 14<sup>th</sup>, 2017. We need bakers, so we are calling for volunteers. We essentially accept nut free bakery, but you can always mark if it has nuts.

# ii. <u>Silent Auction:</u> Presented by Michelle Balcers

Tentatively titled Cootes After Dark, this new fundraiser is being proposed for April 6<sup>th</sup> or 20<sup>th</sup> 2018. We are looking for volunteers who can help with finding entertainment, food and drink, soliciting donations, and marketing the event. It would be a semi-formal or casual gathering with figure food offered and drinks (juice, soda, beer and alcohol). It will take place in the gym of the school and there will be a police officer for security. We must look at the capacity of the gym for chairs and tables. Denise Minardi noted that Prince Philip School used to do similar event on annual basis. While we will try to have most items donated, there will still be some expenses which will need a budget. Lynda confirmed that Home & School can put \$500 as this event wasn't approved earlier.

### iv. Cootes clothing: Presented by Erin Lepischak

There is interest in ordering Cootes Paradise branded clothing such as t-shirts, sweatshirts, sweatpants etc. Kelly Hargreaves has volunteered to coordinate this and is working with Mrs. Mackenzie to determine the best clothing styles. T-shirts would be sold at cost so that students who need these for track or cross country can purchase them at cost. Other items would have a slight mark up so that this would be a fundraiser. This will likely happen in the late winter or spring.

#### v. Read-a-thon: Presented by Heather Harvey

The Read-a-thon will be held Jan 22-Feb 2, 2018 (a week surrounding the literacy day). Thank you to Veronica Riemer who has stepped up to help coordinate this event again. We have \$100 for prizes, one per grade level (kindergarten, primary, junior). Last year the pizza party didn't happen, but this is because there was a problem with the forms. Agreed to try for a pizza party this year and ensure that forms have child's name and classroom on them.

### **6.7 Home & School Logo:** Presented by Michelle Balcers

Two logos were presented for Home & School. Please see attached (Appendix C). Voting by Home & School members occurred. Option 1 was chosen (CP like tree). We can use the school colors (yellow and green).

# **6.8 Arts Council Update:** Update from Lara Borys (but she didn't attend that meeting)

The Arts Council has artists that are interested in Artist in the Classroom for Grades 2 and 5. Specifics such as a project and cost are being worked out. New artwork is on display in the main hallway. Next Arts Council meeting is December  $14^{\rm th}$  at  $3:45 \, \rm pm$  in the library.

## **6.9 Outdoor Space:** Presented by Heather Harvey

Thank you to everyone who came out to move mulch. It wasn't a warm day, but we got a lot done and the playground is in better shape because of it. Moving forward a committee needs to be established to coordinate 2 work days (spring, fall), keep up to date on what work needs to be done, communicate with the school, replace greenery and equipment as needed. There was a recommendation that this group fall under the School Council. Home & School should also put aside \$1000-2000 annually for upkeep and other purchases. No volunteers stepped forward to lead this.

There was a discussion regarding any regulations or legality for parents to show up and do some of the outdoor work needed over weekends and holidays. Principal mentioned that the school is a public space after school hours and in holidays, so it should be fine if it is more flexible for working parents. Principal confirmed that there are contractors to shovel the snow for the school.

## **6.10 Passive fundraising:** Presented by Heather Harvey

Passive fundraising is fundraising that can happen just by shopping at certain retailers where a portion of the sales comes back to the school. A flyer went home this week with a list of places we can receive a % of sales from. These are FlipGive (online sales), Fortinos (Main St. W), Holland Park Garden Gallery and Mabel's Label's and Boston Pizza (Main St. W).



# Appendix D: Dalewood Update for Cootes Paradise Elementary School (November 29, 2017)

**PRO Grant Presentation** – Family Math Events – held the PRO Grant event and presentation on November  $22^{nd}$  featuring Ron Lancaster, Associate Professor in the Teaching Stream (Math specialisation). Ron led a (very cold!) math walk in the afternoon to show parents/students opportunities to see and explore math all around (e.g. fire hydrants (water pressure), slope of roofs, braking distances, volume of garbage bins etc.). He also led an enjoyable evening presentation/discussion with ideas for different books to read, movies/plays to see that have a math theme in them. He also introduced us to different simple games and exercises that use math, but are fun. For example, using the digits 1, 9, 9, and 4 and mathematical operators (exponents, +, -, X,  $\div$ , exponents) to come up with all the numbers from 1 to 100 (e.g. 1 + (9-9)x4=1 etc.)

**Good Shepherd Clothing/Gift Card Drive** – Dalewood is currently running a clothing/gift card drive in support of the Good Shepherd. We are collecting underwear, socks, hats, mitts, gloves and gift cards for families in need. Collection period ends December 15<sup>th</sup>.

**Pizza Days** – Pizza lunch has started at Dalewood – students seem to like it and enjoy having pizza lunch from Pizza Nova as they did at Cootes!

**Facilities** – gym floor has been refinished and is operational once again. A few more items are planned for updates/changes (e.g. change heavy office door to a lighter one, keyless card entry on doors at northeast corner of school by driveway on Haddon side of school).

**Lunch Time permission** – The school is testing a new strategy for signing students out over the lunch break. Parents can provide permission for the child to leave the school grounds any day at lunch time during the fall (they provide blanket permission for a few months at a time). The student's name is added to a list posted by the front door of the school and, if the student is leaving the school during the lunch hour, s/he signs out and signs back in. The process is working well and has cut down on the number of notes each day as well as students "sneaking out" over the lunch hour.

There are students who go out to lunch occasionally and their parents can provide a note to enable them to leave the school grounds on a specific day, rather than any day.

Parents who are uncomfortable with the blanket permission still have the option to provide the notes and parents whose children often leave the school grounds at lunch time do not have to provide notes all the time – so far, it is a good balance and the students like it and are respecting the rules and signing out.
