
We are extremely excited about this opportunity for our Grade 5 students. The program will be introduced within the next few weeks.

Carousel Players Presents: The Incredible Adventures of Mary Jane Mosquito

MARY JANE, THE WINGLESS MOSQUITO, IS DETERMINED TO FIND NEW FRIENDS.

In this story of a misfit searching for her place in the world, Mary Jane is a mosquito who doesn't have wings. At home in Petit Petit Le Paw she is teased by the other mosquitos, who won't be friends with her. She is sent off to school, and then to live with her auntie in the city, as she searches for a place where she can fit in and make friends. After many adventures, Mary Jane learns to make friends sharing her language, her kind heart, and her songs with the world.

This musical show explores themes of feeling like an outsider, dealing with bullying, moving to a new place, and feeling different from the what's considered normal. As Mary Jane tells her tale through song and story, Tomson Highway has woven in Cree words and phrases that are taught to the audience through playful interaction. With live music throughout, and supported with puppetry and fanciful costumes, this is an engaging piece for younger audiences.

Wear Yellow Day (WYD) is a celebration and awareness raising event about active and sustainable school travel. Students, parents, and staff are encouraged to wear yellow; and to walk or wheel to and from school. Our Attendance Reporting System is Changing

One of our greatest priorities is ensuring that all our students arrive safely to school every day. To improve our safe arrival process, HWDSB is adding a new system that will make it easier for you to report – and respond to – your child's school absences. This will take effect on April 22nd, 2019. SafeArrival will let you use a **website**, **mobile app**, or an interactive toll-free **phone number** to report an absence in advance. This will save time when a school needs to verify student attendance, and when notifying families of unexpected or unplanned absences. An email address is required to log in to SafeArrival and to receive notifications. This new, automated SafeArrival process is part of the SchoolMessenger notification system from West, a company used by many Canadian school boards. There is also a new SchoolMessenger mobile app for iOS and Android devices. It will be available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, to make it convenient for you to report future absences. You will soon receive more details on how to sign up for SafeArrival, as we look forward to all families taking part.

Class Placements 2019/20

With a new school year approaching, many parents wonder about who their child's teacher will be. This process for organizing classes will soon be underway. When creating classes, teachers meet with each other and school administration to discuss the needs of each student. Some of the issues that are considered are:

- Balance of ability, interests, and talents
- Balance of males/females
- Learning styles of students
- Teaching styles of teachers
- Resources and remedial needs, enrichment needs
- Students to be kept together or separated because of the positive/negative influence on each other's learning.

We appreciate your trust in our professional judgement in balancing the considerations mentioned above. The final decision for class placements is the responsibility of the principal. If you have further information regarding your child's learning needs that we should consider, please send me an email or note with the specifics. We will not entertain requests for specific teachers. Please consider the bullets listed above. We will do our best to accommodate your child so that we can maximize their learning opportunites and be successful. Please note that all requests are due to Mr. Fede by May 13th, and that class placements are tentative until the end of September.

Out of Catchment Requests

It is hard to believe that the end of the school year is soon approaching. For the 2019/20 school year, both Cootes Paradise & Dalewood schools are closed to any families who live outside of the catchment area.

I would like to take this opportunity to remind all of our Out of Catchment families that have children in Grade 5, that they will have to be registered at their home school for their transition into their Grade 6 academic year.
