Please put names on the clothing so that lost items can be returned to the rightful owners. If the temperature is above -20 degrees Celsius we will be going out doors for recess.

The New Year is a time for setting goals and making positive changes in our lives. I would like to see each of our students **make a goal to be a better friend**. Terminology to be used:

• Fire Exit stairs and ramps

When there is an accumulation of 5 cm of snow, parking lots and sidewalks are plowed by approved contractors arranged through Facilities Management. General salting and sanding of the parking lot is also done by contracted staff prior to the commencement of the school day when deemed necessary by the Facility Management staff. Head Caretakers may salt or sand isolated areas on the parking lot on an as needed basis.

Playgrounds will not be plowed or otherwise cleared. Head Caretakers will check the condition of the grounds early in the morning and during the school day to sand and/or salt isolated slippery areas that may occur due to changing temperatures.

Students should take extra caution when walking onto and leaving from school grounds. Caution must also be taken when playing on school grounds when conditions are slippery. "Particular caution must be used on our play structures when conditions are wet or icy".

Principals may decide, dependent on weather and playground conditions, to have indoor recess and lunch/nutrition breaks.

Head Lice - The Facts: Tiny Ugly Creatures but Nothing to Be Afraid of!

- Lice are transmitted as easily as the common cold
- · Head lice are transmitted mainly through close head to head contact.
- · Children working or playing in small groups are all at risk for transmitting head lice: elementary school day cares- play groups- parties
- · Head lice may also be transmitted by sharing personal items such as: combs- brushes- towels- earphones- hats- stuffed toys- pillows- clothing (especially sweaters or fleeces with hoods)
- · Parents, care-givers, and siblings may acquire head lice from younger children through sharing or pillows, beds, towels, and brushes or combs.
- Head lice are not related in any way to cleanliness and anyone can become infested by them.
- To look for lice examine the head for lice or nits by parting the hair in narrow, vertical sections with a comb or toothpick. Look carefully behind the ears and in the nape of the neck.
- Home remedies have not been clinically proven to work
- There are a number of lice products on the market. Pharmaceutical treatment shampoo or crème rinse products are the most proven method for getting rid of lice.
- Home remedies or frequent washing with regular shampoo are **not** effective in getting rid of head lice.
- · Only treat people with live lice, not just people who have been exposed to lice.
- · Product choices: R&CTM 2in 1 Shampoo Conditioner (a single-step product) Kwellada-P® Creme Rinse- NixTM Crème Rinse
- · Follow the treatment instructions exactly. Some lice products are applied to dry hair and others to wet and/or washed hair.
- · Leave the product on the hair for the exact length of time indicated in the instructions, no more and no less.
- · Remove the nits. This is a time-consuming task but must be done.
- · It can take up to 24 hours for lice to die following treatment.
- · Apply a second application of the lice product 7-10 days after the first treatment to kill any newly hatched lice.

Family Literacy Day

January 27th

Here are some activities that you can do with your child to spend some family literacy time together this month!

Family Literacy Tips from A to Z

Ask your child questions about the story you are reading to develop comprehension.

Book family time to read with your children every day.

Create a special reading place in your home.

Develop a love for reading by being a reading role model.

Engage in sing-along sessions with your children.

Follow a recipe with your child. This is a yummy way to practice reading and math skills.

Give the gift of time and read stories with your child.

Have a word contest. For example, challenge your child to orally make rhyming words or to name a word that has the same meaning as one you name. Then it's your turn.

Introduce a family board game night.

Keep books, magazines and other reading materials in a bag so that you child can read on trips.

Look up the meaning of funny words like 'onomatopoeia' and 'Chinook'.

Make a family journal, together, about special days and celebrations.

Navigate the Internet with your child to find fun and educational web sites.

Organize a children's book club.

Pick one day or night a week to visit your local library or book store.

Quote from some of your favourite rhymes and poems.

Read stories out loud together. This helps with fluency skills.

Start reading early! Infants enjoy hearing the rhythm of language spoken by their parents.

Treat your child to a story a day.

Use your reading time to discuss the story with your child.

Volunteer in your school or tutor adults with their reading skills.

Write a letter or story with your child.

X-ercise your mind by doing cross words and playing word games.

You are the reading role model.

Zap off the television and computer so that you both can read a book.
