A list of the financial transactions is provided by Shelley before every meeting. I am happy to provide the overall document to anyone who is interested, but it is expansive (as in the pizza day purchases cover 8+ pages), so I have provided a summary of the current balances below:

Community support fund balance: \$320

Trivia Night balance: \$1398 - \$966.45 = \$431.55 (see breakdown below)

Indigenous educational programming

Proposal: To consider a fundraising initiative of \$2000 to support Indigenous Educational programming offered by the <u>Woodland Cultural Centre</u> and <u>Onkwehon:we Games</u> for prioritised classes at Dundas Central in alignment with current HWDSB strategic priorities.

Context: The HWDSB has identified Indigenous Education, Reconciliation, and Wellness as a strategic priority in the 2023-2028 Strategic Plan and the Indigenous Education Circle Action Plan (IECAP) 2021-2025. After the last council meeting, there was an opportunity to debrief, consider feedback, and explore alternatives to the mural project that support experiential learning and student achievement in alignment with HWDSB priorities, and in partnership with established educational programming offered by Indigenous-led centres and educators. Outlined below is an updated proposal that will be reviewed, discussed, and, if appropriate, voted on in the Nov 23 school council meeting.

Overview of Fundraising Proposal:

- \$2,000 fundraising goal
 - o Supported through Pizza Day and carry over funds
- Pool of monies would be used to support workshops with either Woodland Cultural Center or Onkwehon:we Games by interested teachers/classes
 - o Prioritization of classes would be at the discretion of the Principal, Teachers, Student Council
 - o Teachers would be welcome to select the resource most appropriate for their class
- A \$2,000 budget would serve 1/3 1/2 of students at Dundas Central to participate in workshops
- · Workshops can be offered on-site at Dundas Central
 - o Teachers have indicated preference for on-site activities (field trips difficult, busing an issue)
- Workshops ideally scheduled in late-Spring
 - o Teachers have indicated preference for scheduling in late-Spring
- Both the Woodland Cultural Center and Onkwehon:we Games are recommended as an educational resource by HWDSB
- Funds raised would go directly to supporting Indigenous educators, programs, and cultural centers
- · Volunteer support may be helpful the day workshops run but programs are relatively low-lift to implement and deliver for school staff
- Unused monies could be earmarked to support Indigenous Educational Programming in 2024/25 (i.e. Sept 30, Orange Shirt Day)

1. Woodland Cultural Centre

<u>The Woodland Cultural Centre</u>, formerly the Mohawk Institute Residential School, offers a variety of tours, education programs, and workshops that offer students the opportunity to learn about an

assortment of topics covering the past, present, and future of Southern Ontario's First Nations peoples.

The K-12 programs cover a variety of Hodinohsho:ni topics ranging from culture, history, art, food, and past/current issues that are age/grade appropriate and follow the Ontario Curriculum guidelines. New programming for kindergarten that includes a combination of a Thanksgiving Address workshop and the Importance of Apples and Orange Shirt Day is also coming soon. Each program offers teachers/educators before and after resources for their classrooms. Add-on craft activities are also available at an added charge.

Cost: Virtual/On-site (Schools/Charities) \$300.00 for workshop up to 40 participants (\$7.50/additional attendee) with virtual capacity of up to 500 participants, plus a \$350 speaker fee for on-site school events. \$5/per person for add-on crafts activities.

2. Onkwehon:we Games

Onkwehon:we Games (pronounced *On-gway-hon-way*, Mohawk word that translates as "the original people") offers workshops/programs where participants learn about the history and culture of the people of the Six Nations (also called Haudenosaunee) through Traditional Games. Interactive and hands-on, their approach to teaching is Indigenous in its foundation. While learning about Lacrosse and other Traditional Games of the Six Nations of the Grand River, students will simultaneously be learning about and experiencing local First Nations culture. Based on the understanding that everything is interconnected, the programming is interdisciplinary by

nature, weaving Native Studies with Health & Physical Education, History, Geography, Social Studies & Outdoor Education.

Onkwehon:we Games offers online, outdoor and indoor (gym) programs all of which can be geared towards all ages and abilities. Generally, the workshops run 1-2 hours, however, they are happy to work with each group to provide a program that suits each school/student's needs. Ideally group sizes do not exceed 35 participants. Best suited to Grade 4 and up.

Cost: In-person \$350 for a half day (1 or 2 workshops), \$700 for a full day (2 to 4 workshops), Travel Fees are an additional \$150 (max). Additional costs to purchase game kits for the class (\$10 to \$65 each); 2-3 week lead time required for traditional game kits.

Eco Committee

Ioana

Overview

The main objective of the Dundas Central School Council Eco Committee ("Eco Committee") is to support and promote environmentally-focused initiatives at Dundas Central. The Eco Committee will use a sustainability lens when looking at school council initiatives, the school learning environment, and the broader school community.

Initiatives proposed for the current school year include actions to (i) enhance environmental learning and appreciation, (ii) reduce waste, (iii) promote active and sustainable transportation, and (iv) mitigate climate change impacts. Efforts will build towards the longer-term goals of EcoSchools and Healthy School Certification.

The Eco Committee proposes to raise funds for these initiatives through a basket raffle and plant sale at the Spring Open House.

School resources: Purchasing more iPads for upper grades

Joanne

Most students at Dundas Central used their own personal electronic devices for online learning during the pandemic. Unused school iPads were loaned out to less privileged schools in Hamilton. Forty (40) of these iPads were never returned (estimated \$20,000 loss in equipment). There is a shortage of devices at the school. This is restricting students' ability to complete school assignments. While iPads can be shared in younger grades, senior-level students must log in individually and cannot share devices. School council has not raised funds for new iPads in many years.

Cost: \$420-\$620 each, not including accessories.

Rationale:

Directly improves student achievement
Demonstrated school need
Strong support from teachers of junior/senior grades
Straightforward to implement
