How do you graduate?



Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD)

Credit Requirements

30 credits to graduate...18 **compulsory** courses +12 **optional** courses

Grades 9, 10, and 11 - 8 credits earned each year (3x8 = 24)

Grade 12 - 6 credits earned and possibly 2 study periods (total = 30)

Courses are divided between 2 semesters - 4 credits per semester

Final exams are compulsory and written in January and June.

What else do you need to graduate?

40 hours of community involvement activities

(see hwdsb.on.ca for detailed information and forms)

Students enter hours in **The Hub** using **Hour Republic** after mid-August





With their personal IPP account students can:


- View a summary of the information they have saved

Using our various assessment tools, students can:







Postsecondary Planning




