Responding

As a school, we will hold students accountable for the language they use. Everyone has the right to safe and inclusive spaces that are free from discrimination and harassment motivated by bias, prejudice and hate. It is our collective responsibility and obligation to **stop**, **address** and **support** when acts of bias, hate or prejudice occur. Behaviours or actions in school that intentionally or unintentionally harm others based on the person's ancestry, national or ethnic origin, race, language, colour, religion, sed, age, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression must be addressed. I am sharing a graphic that we use to address these issues. These acts are never acceptable and will result in progressive discipline which can include suspension.

All students, staff, parents/guardians/caregivers, and visitors at HWDSB have the right to safe and inclusive spaces that are free from discrimination and harrassment motivated by bias, prejudice and hate.

It is our collective responsibility and obligation to stop, address and support when acts of bias, hate or prejudice occur.

Behaviours or actions in school that intentionally or unintentionally harm others based on the person's ancestry, national or ethnic origin, race, language, colour, religion, sex, age, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression must be addressed.



1: INTERRUPT

 Stop the harmful act with a firm and fair tone of voice to show all present that the behaviour is being addressed.



2: IDENTIFY

- Explicitly label the form of harassment and focus on the unacceptable language being used. E.g. "That comment is racist/transphobic/etc."
- Focus is on the language, not the individual.



3: EXPLAIN and SUPPORT

- Ensure the immediate safety of the individual(s) impacted. Ask how you can support their well-being.
- Use emotion coaching to validate their experience and communicate their importance to the school community.



4: ASK FOR CHANGE and REPORT

- Explain that the incident will be reported, and that the student should not use that unacceptable language again.
- Document and report the incident, and follow-up with all impacted.



5: ENSURE ACCOUNTABILITY

- All HWDSB staff have an obligation to stop actions of discrimination and harassment, and to take proactive measures to create inclusive learning environments for all students.
- Ensure the above steps are followed, students are supported, and the incident is properly reported.

Safe Schools Safety Awareness Month: "Prepared Together, Safe Together"

From the last week of September through mid-November, our school will be participating in Secure Secures Safety Awareness Month.

This initiative helps us gently practice important safety procedures, including fire evacuation, lockdown, hold and secure, shelter in place, and bomb threat response. We understand that drills may bring up different feelings or memories for some students, especially those with past experiences of conflict or emergencies. Our staff will approach each practice with care and reassurance.

You may hear your child talking about drills or safety activities. Please encourage open conversations and let them know it's okay to have feelings or questions about these practices. Together, we can support students in feeling safe, prepared, and cared for at school.

PEANUT ALLERGY

Mobile Devices - Reminder

Students must not use their personal electronic devices (e.g., cell phones, laptops and tablets) during the instructional day, unless directed to do so by an educator.

• Students in Kindergarten to Grade 8 must have their devices stored out of view and powered off (or on silent mode) throughout the full instructional day (school day), including nutrition breaks unless permitted by the educator

Students are responsible for their personal mobile devices and how they use them. If an educator sees a personal mobile device not stored out of view and powered off, the student must hand it in for the instructional day. It will be placed by the student in a storage area in a location designated by the educator.

Home and School is an association made up solely of parent volunteers of Frank Panabaker North & South.

THIRD: You pay \$20 to the Home and School to cover the insurance for yourself each year. This gives you voting rights for spending funds at meetings.

The Difference between Bullying, Aggression and Teasing



Bullying always involves aggression. Aggression becomes bullying when it is repeated over time between the same individuals and there is a power imbalance.

Conflict can be positive or negative. Bullying is a form of negative conflict. Conflict becomes bullying when it is repeated over time and involves a power differential.

Teasing becomes hostile when it implies interpersonal rejection and social exclusion, rather than camaraderie and social inclusion.

Bullying

Bullying is behavior that includes the use of any physical, verbal, electronic, written or other means. Bullying is intentional aggressive behaviour. If aggressive behaviour is physical, it may include hitting, pushing, slapping, and tripping. If it is verbal, it may include name calling, mocking, insults, threats, and sexist, racist, homophobic, or transphobic comments. If it is social or relational aggression, it is more subtle and may involve such behaviours as gossiping, shunning, ignoring, spreading rumours, excluding others from a group, or humiliating others with public gestures or graffiti. Social aggression may also occur through the use of technology (e.g., spreading rumours, images, or hurtful comments through the use of e-mail, cell phones, text messaging, Internet websites, social networking, or other technology).

Aggression

Aggressive behaviour is conflict that may be intentional or unintentional, direct or indirect. It can take many forms, including physical, verbal, and social. It can be experienced in a number of ways including physical, mental, emotional, and psychological harm.

Teasing

Teasing can be positive or negative.

Positive Teasing:

- · illustrates closeness, affection, and familiarity with another person
- person being teased is not distressed
- takes place within a strong relationship
- · strengthens the relationship

Negative Teasing:

- alienates, criticizes, and embarrasses the other person
- the person being teased is distressed
- takes place within a weak relationship
- undermines the relationship
