

Course Types and Pathways

- **Destreamed** courses in grade 9 lead to **applied** or **academic** courses in grade 10
- **Applied** courses in grade 10 lead to **college** course types in grade 11
- **Academic** courses in grade 10 lead to **university** or **college** course types in grade 11
- **Locally developed** courses in grades 9 & 10 lead to **workplace** course types in grade 11

Reading Course Codes

Every course in an Ontario Secondary School has a six-character course code with each character identifying the course discipline, grade, course type or pathway, and a school-specific program.

Consider this example: **CGG3O1**

The first character identifies the course discipline, which in this example is **Canadian and World Studies.**

- **A** = Arts
- **B** = Business
- **C** = Canadian and World Studies

- **E** = English or English as a Second Language (ESL) or English Literacy Development (ELD)
- **F** = French
- **G** = Guidance and Career Education
- **H** = Humanities and Social Sciences
- **I** = Interdisciplinary Studies or Computer Studies
- **L** = Classical Studies and International Languages
- **M** = Mathematics
- **N** = First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Studies
- **P** = Physical and Health Education
- **S** = Science
- **T** = Technology

Reading Course Codes (cont.)

The fourth character identifies the grade level, which in this example is Grade 11–CGG301.

- 1 = Grade 9
- 2 = Grade 10
- 3 = Grade 11
- 4 = Grade 12
- *Note: ESL/ELD courses use the letters A, B, C, D, and E to differentiate courses but are not linked to specific grade levels*

Reading Course Codes (cont.)

The fifth character identifies the course type or pathway, which is **Open** in this example--CGG3O1.

- W = Destreamed
- D = Academic
- P = Applied
- L = Locally Developed
- O = Open
- Grade 11 and 12 courses:
 - C = College
 - M = College/University
 - U = University
 - E = Workplace
 - O = Open

Course Codes—Glendale Specific 7th characters

- Courses ending in ‘A’ = ABPA (Audition Based Program of the Arts)
- Courses ending in ‘L’ or ‘S’ = ESL (English as a Second Language)
- Courses ending in ‘eL’ = eLearning
- For example:
 - ADA3M1 = drama
 - ADA3M1A = drama for ABPA major
 - CHC2P1 = history
 - CHC2P1S = history for ESL students (English as a Second Language)
 - ENG2D1 = English
 - ENG2D1eL = English eLearning

eLearning Course Graduation Requirement

Key Details--The following is a synopsis of key components of PPM 167:

- All students who entered secondary school beginning in September 2020 must earn a minimum of two online learning credits as part of the requirements for an Ontario Secondary School Diploma;
- Students may be exempted from this requirement at the request of their parents/guardians through an opt-out process (students 18 or older can opt themselves out);
- Students working towards other certificates (for example, the certificate of accomplishment or an Ontario Secondary School Certificate) are not required to complete the online learning requirement;
- The requirement can be met through the successful completion of 2 full online credits;
- Online learning credits towards the graduation requirement may be earned **at any time** during the student's secondary school program or through a “reach ahead” prior to September of their grade nine year;
- Credits earned in the following manner are ineligible: in-person learning, blended learning, flipped classrooms, and remote learning.

OPT OUT PROCESS: Families have the ability to opt out of the online learning requirement by completing a form in Parent Portal.

OPT OUT PROCESS:
Students have the ability to opt out of the online learning requirement by completing a form in Parent Portal OR by having your parent/caregiver email your guidance counsellor with the request OR by completing the form in the guidance office.

Grade 9s

- Select courses for appropriate pathway (applied/academic/locally developed)—do your research NOW through MyBlueprint
- FIVE compulsory courses for grade 10—English, math, science, history and civics/careers
- May need to include French, geography, arts, technology or gym as well
- Make sure you have proper prerequisites for courses—a red flag means you can't take the course!
- Select summer school courses through Continuing Education section in MyBlueprint

Grade 10s

- English and math are the only mandatory courses for grade 11 (as long as the other compulsory courses are completed)
- Ensure arts, tech, phys ed and STEM course requirements are complete
- Catch up on any failed or missed compulsory courses from grade 9/10
- OSSLT is being written in the spring for students taking Grade 10 English in semester 2: Dates TBD
- Declare interest in SHSM programs
 - Arts & Culture
 - Business
 - Non-Profit
 - Transportation

Grade 10s

- SHSM programs will require coop (a.m. or p.m. or all day) and the correct majors (4 of them) and other courses
- Do appropriate pathways research using MyBlueprint and make appropriate and informed decisions on schools and programs
- Make sure you have proper prerequisites for courses—a red flag means you can't take the course!
- Summer coop pre-placement work starts in APRIL through the HUB; face to face sessions in May and June in the evening and coop starts in JULY—you MUST find your own placement!
- Select summer school courses through Continuing Education section in MyBlueprint

English: Understanding Contemporary First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Voices, Grade 11




**NBE3 can be used to meet the Grade 11 English requirements*

Identities, relationships, and self-determination, sovereignty, and self-governance are key concepts in First Nations, Métis, and Inuit cultures.

It is critically important that students learn to appreciate the responsibility that creators on Turtle Island have to First Nations, Métis, and Inuit cultures, world views, and diversity through authentic and accurate representations of Indigenous lives

This course will be taught in consultation with Indigenous community partners from Six Nations of the Grand River and Mississaugas of the Credit, our territory's Host Nations.

Fill your Education Bundle with critical knowledge about treaty partner and Indigenous relationships, in the spirit of meaningful truth and reconciliation.



Why the move to NBE?

- Learn more about the host nations in your location.
- Learn about what it means to be a treaty partner.
- Learn to think about your role within a community.
- Learn a lot about oral communication especially through storytelling.
- Read a variety of texts from First Nations, Métis, and Inuit creators
- Create a variety of texts through print and media.
- Develop your critical thinking skills
- Prepares you for grade 12 English

Grade 11s

- English is the only mandatory subject to select for grade 12
- Select courses needed for graduation and program requirements
- Ensure Group 1, 2 and 3 categories are complete as well
- Do appropriate pathway research using MyBlueprint and make appropriate and informed decisions on schools and programs
- Only ONE study period may be selected for grade 12
- Make sure you have proper prerequisites for courses—a red flag means you can't take the course!
- Summer coop pre-placement work starts in APRIL through the HUB; face to face sessions in May and June in the evening and coop starts in JULY—you MUST find your own placement!
- Select summer school courses through Continuing Education section in MyBlueprint

Grade 11s

- Do your post-secondary research for program requirements
 - Ontariocolleges.ca for College Diploma and some University Degree programs
 - Ontariouniversitiesinfo.ca for University Degree programs
 - Six 4U or 4M courses are needed for all University and some College programs
- Continue to take appropriate courses for SHSM or special program
 - Coop MUST be included in grade 11 or 12 to be eligible
- If you are unsuccessful on OSSLT, you will be placed in the OSSLC for grade 12 (one of your electives will be removed)
- Community Involvement Hours and elearning courses or opt out should be completed before grade 12

Summer School

- Course selection will be through Continuing Education section in MyBlueprint
- Course takes place during the month of July
- ONLY online courses available
- Usually ONLY compulsory courses offered
- Can ONLY take one course or summer COOP

Special Programs @ Glendale

- HWDSB Strings
- Program of the Arts
 - Audition-Based Program--visual arts, media arts, instrumental music, contemporary music, strings, vocals, drama, production, dance (2 arts courses a year)
- Specialist High Skills Majors (SHSM)—more on next slide
- Coop (full day or half day)

SHSM Programs @ Glendale

- Specialist High Skills Majors (SHSM)--see the HUB page for detailed info
 - Arts & Culture
 - Business
 - Non-Profit
 - Transportation
 - Start in Grade 11, finish in Grade 12 when you graduate
 - Focused courses in a specific area, coop, reach aheads, field trips, certifications and industry-recognized training
 - Red Seal on OSSD
 - TWO-year commitment—need to follow through with this!
- SUMMER COOP information comes out in April—mandatory meeting at the HWDSB office
 - Process is demanding and must be complete in order to be approved
 - Pre-placement work is on HUB and is completed before the end of the school year
 - Select summer coop through Continuing Education section in MyBlueprint

Grade 12s and 12+s

- Potential graduates have been identified—list will be in guidance
- MyBlueprint option has been set to **NOT RETURNING**
- You will need to explain to a guidance counsellor why you are in need of a semester 1 timetable (34 credit cap); may need continuing education instead
- If you are out of catchment, you will return to your catchment school—transportation is NOT provided beyond graduation
- You may be able to upgrade courses but priority will go to next year's grade 12s and students needing the courses for graduation
- Acceptance in post-secondary is conditional—must maintain marks
- Ensure all requirements are met for graduation and SHSM (if applicable)
- Completion of OSSLT/OSSLC, online courses (opt out) and CIH is **MANDATORY**

Grade 12s and 12+s

- Grade 12s and 12+s on a 5 year plan who don't meet the OSSD requirements are able to select courses through MyBlueprint
- Attendance and marks are important
- Full disclosure for semester 2 is May 5, 2026
- Must have 3 courses to be a full-time student—part-time status only granted by principal (typically not done—should go to continuing ed)
- Refer to separate handout for the Class of 2026
- Graduation vs. Commencement
- Commencement is Wednesday, June 24th at Liuna Station
