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## Why Choose College?

- Less theory and more practical experience
- More than 240 degree programs offered this September
- A career focused education
- Preparation for highly competitive programs. Example: Pre-health
- Preparation for some University pathways. Example: General Arts and Sciences

## Top Reasons From the Colleges

### Look to the Future

- 40% of all new Jobs created within the next decade will be in skilled trades and technology (Source: Skills Canada)

### Employability

- 85% of recent College graduates found employment within six months after graduation (Source: Colleges Ontario)

## Four Kinds of Programs

- Apprenticeship Programs
- One Year Certificate Programs
- Two Year and Three Year Diploma Programs
- Four Year Degree Programs

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## Admission Requirements

- Apprenticeship programs require a job in the field (require sponsorship)
- Certificate programs may only require a high school diploma
- Diploma programs require specific courses at the “C” level like ENG4C1 or MCT4C1
- Degree programs require six 4U or 4M courses like ENG4U1 and five more



## Requirements for College Application

- OSSD
- 30 credits
- 20 Community Hours for volunteer service
- OSSLT requirement waved for June 2022 Graduates
- ENG4C (for most programs) or ENG4U



## Requirements for College Application

- Some college programs in Science or Technology require specific courses (prerequisites)
- Some college programs require; CPR, first aid, a medical history, criminal record check and or an entrance exam
- It is the student's responsibility to ensure that they have completed all prerequisites for their chosen program



## Collaborative College/University Programs

- Some Universities and Colleges have programs that allow students to earn both a degree and a diploma (**usually need 4U courses to be accepted**)
- Some programs use the University application (OUAC)
- Some programs use the College application (found on [ontariocolleges.ca](http://ontariocolleges.ca))



## Four Questions Before Applying

- What program do you want?
- What colleges offer that program?
- What are the required courses?
- Are there minimum required marks?



## Differences Between College & University

### University Example:

- A University will receive 9000 applications for 600 seats. Students will apply with averages in the 70's, 80's and 90's
- A program having 600 spaces means that the school will send out 1000 offers (they know that 400 students will say "no")
- Therefore, an average of "85%" across six classes is used because only 1000 students had an average this high



## How College Admission Works

### Scenario 1

- A program has 85 seats and 60 students apply – everyone is admitted!

### Scenario 2

- A program has 100 seats and 2000 students apply
- Only students with a minimum grade of “75%” in English are given an initial offer
- If any of those students say “no” the college moves down the list (i.e. “74%”)





## How MacNab Communicates

- On November 19, 2021, student information will be shared with Ontario Colleges. This information includes:
- Demographics (name, address, etc.)
- Final Grades (from all high school courses, 9-11)
- Final grades for quadmester 1
- List of all courses that you are enrolled in for 2021/2022



## Important Dates

- Today's Assembly
- Deadline for Applying to College
- Date for equal consideration for highly competitive programs: February 1, 2022. Applications received and paid for before this date will be given equal consideration. Applicants for all programs are encouraged to apply before this date as website volumes are highest at this time



## More Important Dates!

February 1, 2022

- Earliest date the Colleges may release offers.
- Offers will continue until programs are filled or wait lists are established

May 1, 2022

- The most common deadline for confirming an offer
- Applicants should check their offers of admission for exact deadline dates

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## Cost of Applying to College

- College: \$95 is the application fee even if you only apply to 1 school and program. The \$95 fee allows you to apply to a maximum of 3 programs at one school and 5 programs in total
- Payment is accepted by VISA, MasterCard, Amex, money order, certified cheque, or online banking (but credit card is the fastest)
- Note: you cannot pay extra or submit a second application to add more programs or College choices



## Ontario College Application System (OCAS)

- This is the organization that collects personal and grade information from college applicants and sends it on to the Colleges to which the applicant has applied

## How to Apply to College

Information that you need to know before you begin your application:

- **OEN** (Ontario Education Number) and student number found on your school status sheet or transcript. Ask Student services for help if you need to find these numbers
- MacNab's Mident Number – **941719**
- A valid email address
- Your complete home mailing address including postal code



## Getting Started with the Application

1. Go to: [ontariocolleges.ca](http://ontariocolleges.ca) and click **APPLY**
2. Select the option that applies to you
3. New Users: If you have never created an account then click **SIGN UP TODAY**
4. Returning to your application: If you have an existing account then click **SIGN IN HERE**



## Grades

- Colleges do not post admission averages
- Colleges post minimum grades (e.g. 70% in ENG4C1)
- Some Colleges will only use required course marks for admission (Mohawk does this)
- Some Colleges will use an average of senior level marks including required courses (Sheridan does this)
- Most Colleges will treat C level and U level courses equally (Conestoga gives 10 bonus marks to U and M courses)



## Required Courses in Semester Two/Q3-Q4?

- Each College has its own policy
- Some Colleges try to fill seats in March
- If the ENG4C1 class is semester two, Colleges will use ENG3C1 from last year
- Some Colleges reserve spaces for students with prerequisites in semester two – some offers go out in March and some go out in May





## Upgrading

- Colleges will use the highest attempt, not the most recent (good news!)
- Colleges will usually wait for summer school grades and re-evaluate your application in August (but not for all competitive programs)





## What is in your Control?

- Not much! Colleges have policies and worrying about them won't help!
- Do your very best in every course, especially the courses required for your program

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## What does it Cost to go to College?

- Diploma Programs - \$2500
- Graduate Certificate Programs - \$3600
- Bachelor's Degree Programs - \$6100
- Collaborative Programs - \$5000
- Ancillary Fees - \$800
- Books and supplies - \$1300



## Cost of Living – Different Considerations

- Do you want a private room or a room you share with another student?
- Do you want a full meal plan or do you want to cook or purchase some of your own meals (outside of a meal plan)?
- The cost of two terms in a student residence will usually cost between \$4500 - \$6000 (or more in some cases)
- If you want to live off campus then you will have to budget for the cost of rent, electricity, phone and internet, consumables, food and entertainment
- The tuition and cost of living for international programs varies



## OSAP

- OSAP is a combination of grants and loans given to students who are pursuing post-secondary education
- OSAP is based on a series of criteria (family income, course load, program of study, etc.) to determine a student's eligibility
- You cannot apply for OSAP until you have been accepted and have confirmed your program choice

## Scholarships and Bursaries

### Scholarships

- Are awarded for scholastic achievement (academics, school involvement, volunteerism, etc.)
- You do not pay back scholarships

### Bursaries

- Are granted based on financial need (family income, student status, etc.)
- You do not pay back bursaries
