Housekeeping Items

Working Group #4 meeting minutes – approved

Correspondence – 2 pieces

Barbara Stares thanked Nadine Bernacki for her work on alternate options and moved that Nadine presents her options to the committee. Committee agreed by show of hands.

Q. Is there a way for people to present their cases/delegations to the committee?

A. Yes if the committee decided that they would want someone to come in to present. People can also present a delegation to the board. We could also reach out to the individual to ask if their contact information can be shared, thereby allowing a committee member to reach out for information.

Nadine presented her thinking around her options thanking the committee for the opportunity, noting she is honoured to be part of the committee. She also pointed out that we need to remember that the school board has asked us and our communities to put together a long-term vision. My vision is a vision for the future. I understand it is up to the staff to look at the numbers. Even if we have constraints within this process it is I hope we can keep the door open. Keep the community hub a possibility. There are a lot of passionate people working on this process.

No further questions on correspondence.

Q. There seems to be a downsizing of the big schools. How does the government do that? Will they reduce the OTG if you mothball a wing, take away a certain number of classrooms from active use? Will they take that into consideration when they consider overall utilization?

A. Bob – In my experience this has been done. An example of a PTR (prohibitive to repair) project at another school Board was given. I have not seen it happen at a newer school that is not in disrepair. Like most capital projects, there would likely need to be a business case submitted to the Ministry for funding. If the trustees decided they wanted to do that ask they would prepare a report and ask. When instructional school space is physically removed, that portion of its capacity would be removed as it is no longer there.

Q. If we have space available at a school and if we can find a community partner to lease space in that school can we use that space as a way to reduce the OTG?



A. I think there would be consideration on the ministry side if it was used for community use. To be a community partner you must qualify under education system specifics – meet certain criteria conducive to education and the safety of students. The ministry wants us to have community partners as an alternative to occupy spaces.

Q. How many hours a week does the community partner have to occupy the space?

A. I don't think it's built that way – if the partnership aligns with the board's vision I don't think there is a minimum amount.

Q. Comment for Nadine – from a financial point of view the board is suggesting to close Hess St. to save money but your suggestion is to build two additional schools at a tremendous cost. We or the Trustees would have to decide the best use of the ten million it would cost to build those additional schools – would it be best used to spend on the nine schools?

A. Nadine – I'm suggesting a long-term vision. It wouldn't be something that we can engage in now. It is possible next year or even five years.

Q. How is the Dr. Davey community centre viewed?

A. It is not a part of Dr. Davey

Q. Why did we build Dr. Davey for that many (800) students?

A. The decisions that were made at that time were based on enrolments and school consolidations that didn't come to fruition.

Q: If you reached out to community informing them of available space without much interest will there be another attempt to reach out to community once this process is over?

A. If the committee is reaching consensus for the board to explore community hubs more in depth and have specific partners that we might want to approach directly as opposed to the yearly send out, then I think the trustees will hear that and will direct staff to do that. We do our best to reach out to 1000+ organizations/people. They are invited to come forward to hear what is available. We remind you that being in a school means very particular rules and needing to work with the space provided (often a classroom). Some partners might not see it as a viable opportunity. It is different for new builds because you can purpose build it. We are mandated by the province to speak to the communities about potential partnerships.

Q. Beyond community partners is there thought of having space for the purposes of things like the innovation centre?

Comment: In terms of what other drivers there are – the whole issue is what is enough excess space? it is vitally important to have a cushion if we needed it for more people.

Sue Dunlop clarified that the committee is not choosing an option. We are here to talk about the options and hear from the public on what they would like to see in the future.

Option/Analysis

Bob reviewed the options – with discussion from committee

Q. John Efthimiadis, had an opportunity to survey staff at Bennetto and there were comments around improving accessibility and modernization of the facility. Is it possible to get funds to modernize in the current state it is in? On the 1st option where we receive a large chunk of Hess/dual stream school, how would that impact the way the staff/students feel in the building? There are often times we feel we are at capacity.

Additional options

- Open one FI school at Strathcona site and combine Strathcona and Hess Jk-8
- Hess / Strathcona Jk-5 with 6-8 to Ryerson (with a reno at Ryerson) committee wants the info on this option
- Change in Central boundary for 6-8 – all 6-8 at Central go to Queen Victoria instead of Ryerson – committee wants info on this option
- 62 out of catchment to Bennetto
- Those bussed to Ryerson – go to Bennetto



Public Meeting

Sue reviewed the public meeting agenda (from flyer)

What do we want to communicate, how do we communicate, capturing feedback?

- Possible to present pros / cons?
- Should we approach something like consensus for last working group meeting.
- Present top-level options
- Want the public to know the work of the committee
- Need to make it clear that we don't make the final decision / that we have to present the info to trustees
- Important we are transparent – present key issues, over capacity, decaying options. Present the initial option again and then the additional options we have come up with, explain potential benefits from possible closure of a school
- Should we have the option on boards for viewing – people can add their feedback
- Could we provide people with a questionnaire? No – potential for labour intensive work/different languages
- Great thing is the opportunity to receive funds to make our schools better – help support student achievement. Question for the public – what would you like to see at your child's school? What is your vision of the downtown core / growth? What is their vision of the school's role in the community? Renovation to structure? Resources?

Housekeeping Items

- Review of Hess/Strathcona JK-5 model with Eng 6-8 to Ryerson (FI at Bennetto)
Sue Dunlop reviewed the PowerPoint presentation. Bob Fex reviewed the maps and boundaries of the proposed merged schools. These are options to consider. No decisions have been made.

Q. Where would the new school site be located?

A. TBD

Q. Would the new school be built in the Hess/Strathcona neighbourhoods?

A. The intent is to keep the area walkable, however the site is TBD.

Q. The Bennetto numbers change very little with the additional of FI...Why is that?

A. The enrolment at Bennetto is declining the growth would be coming from the FI program.

- Nadine Bernacki reviewed her latest submission to the committee.

The majority of Sage families live in Strathcona catchment and are highly unlikely to send their children to Bennetto. If the Sage Program was to move highly unlikely the numbers would grow.

Q. Are the five year renewal figures high and urgent?

A. Yes.

Public Meeting #2 preparation

- When presenting these options we need to remind them they are just ideas.
- The first option was in detail.
- Show of hands- detailed options- yes-consensus.

- Should we present the new option brought up tonight EK/Central/Ryerson? Consolidation of 3 schools with two new schools to be built on land that we own currently or we have to acquire.



- Central is designated, Earl Kitchener would likely become designated very quickly. Neither site can be built on.
- Not all of the committee is present.
- Timelines are tight to gather necessary data. What if the numbers don't work?
- Address this option as something we are thinking about

A. Status Quo

- No change to all nine schools
- Support: No one is displaced.
- Concern: No access to additional Ministry funding. Facility concerns remain as is. Back in line for renewal.

B. All nine schools stay open with boundary and program changes to balance population

- FI program changes in asterisks
- Support: Redistributions population. Reduces portable need. Not as crowded.
- Concern: Lots of students moving schools. No access to additional Ministry funding.

C. JK-8 Model-Consolidation of Hess/Strathcona with a new school on a location to be determined

- Support: Additional funding possible. New facility instead of repairing older facility. Sibs together.
- Concern: Some disruption. Site is unknown. Relocate students somewhere while build takes place.

D. JK- 5 Model Consolidation of Hess/Strathcona with a new school on a location to be determined (with Central, Hess and Strathcona- going to Ryerson and FI to Bennetto)

- Support: Smaller school community.
- Concern: Relocate students while build takes place. Sibs in two schools.

E. Consolidation of Ryerson/Earl Kitchener/Central to balance population and facility renewal costs

- Support: Address facility renewal costs.
- Concern: Heritage Buildings-Neither Central nor EK site will not be available for a build. Ryerson site would be available

- D- Hess and Strathcona combine into a new K-5 school, English to Ryerson in grade 6, location to be determined, new FI program at Bennetto
- E- Central, Earl Kitchener, Ryerson combine into 2 new K-8 schools, Hess and Strathcona combine into a K-8 school, New FI at Bennetto, all locations to be determined

Question and Answer

Q1. Grades being taught at other schools?

A1. Ryerson is a 6-8 school.

Closing schools will result in young people going to jail. No need to close schools this is not a third world.

Q2. All ideas are fake. Think about the future. Give the land away- the City owns. Are you trying to use us to make your work easier? Or are we trying to help?

A2. We are listening to your feedback. We want to know what you think. All of you.

Q3. Options A & B. Is the purpose of the accommodation review just to get funds? Are options A & B really viable options?

A3. Trustees are very interested in what you are saying and they will consider all ideas.

Q4. If Hess Street was to close are we going to get crossing guards where we need them? Will children be safe walking to school?

A4. Crossing guards are hired by the City of Hamilton. We will work with the City. They look at the number of students to have an increase of crossing guards.

Q5. Are the initial ideas still on the table? Why were they not included in the ideas presented tonight?

A5. Yes. We have already gathered feedback at the first public meeting.

Q6. Why are we only talking about five ideas? Can the initial ideas be put on the table for further discussion?

A6. Yes. But we have already gathered feedback on those ideas. There many pages of excellent feedback posted on the website.

Q7. Does anyone think about the children and the stress of moving schools?

A7. Yes. We all want the best possible facilities for the children now and in the future. There are parents as well as staff on the committee. We understand it can be very emotional and hard to talk about.

Q8. Has the potential West Harbour growth been taken into consideration?

Q8. Yes – Note: without knowing the true unit types and counts, it precludes us from capturing true values. Development plans are just in the beginning stages. We have factored this information to the best of our ability. City of Hamilton staff have outlined information about future development.

Q9. Regarding idea E- new schools for Earl Kitchener, Central and Ryerson. If we looked at additions to expand these schools would this be funded as a new school or renovation? Gutting and rebuilding an entire school?

A9. This would be considered a renovation.



Q10. How many schools have been closed in Hamilton? Where does HWDSB rank compared to other Boards in closing schools?

A10. I don't have that information. It can be provided to the committee.

Q11. Clarify what no funding means if the trustees choose option A& B. Capital?

A11. The School Board receives funding from the Ministry for school renewal, and maintenance. There is also funding for Boards to apply for new school builds. In order to apply for the money the schools have to hold a Pupil Accommodation Review.

Q12. What was the initial option from the first staff report?

A12. To close Hess Street School and to redistribute the majority of students to Bennetto and some to Stathcona schools.

Q13. Are Central and Earl Kitchener designated historical buildings and how would this effect a new build?

A13. Central is designated a historical building. Earl Kitchener is not but it is an interest. The schools could potentially be sold and the buyer would be required to follow the guidelines from the City. The buildings cannot be torn down.

We need a school community hub.

Q14. Ultimately the decision is up to the trustees. Will they really look at the committee's recommendations? Will this be made public?

A14. The committee gathers all the information and a report is presented to the trustees. The trustees look at all the ideas and make a decision. Yes, all this information is made public. All minutes are posted on the website.

Q15. Funding comes from consolidation and closing schools. Any options for the trustees to change this process.

A15. Yes, trustees can speak to the Ministry.

Q16. How will parents pick up sick children without a car?

A16. Schools work with parents to figure out a plan.

Trustees decision – June 2017.

As part of Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board's (HWDSB) Policy Accommodation Review process, the public is invited to provide feedback on staff recommendations. On March 8, 2017, the West Hamilton community was invited to a community meeting held at Sir John A. Macdonald Secondary School. Attendees were asked to provide HWDSB with feedback through participation in discussion groups about the following five boundary change ideas:

Idea A: No schools close, No boundary changes

Idea B: Balancing Utilization and FI introduced at Bennetto (No schools close, FI at Bennetto, Yes boundary & program changes)

Idea C: Hess/Strathcona JK-8 Merge (site TBD), FI at Bennetto

Idea D: Hess/Strathcona JK-5 Merge (site TBD), 6-8 English at Ryerson, FI at Bennetto

Idea E: Hess/Strathcona JK-8 Merge, Central/Earl Kitchener/Ryerson Merge (sites TBD), FI at Bennetto

Attendees were asked the following three questions based on the five ideas presented:

- What do you think of Ideas A, B, C, D, E? (this question was posed five times, once for each of the ideas)
- Is there an idea you prefer and why?
- What are the three most important things to address at your school? (Attendees were asked to identify the school in their response)

Facilitators supported the discussions at each table by recording the conversations. Facilitator notes were then shared with E-BEST, HWDSB's research department. E-BEST conducted a thematic analysis of the conversations.

In total, 84 community members signed in as participants in the consultation, including representation from Bennetto, Central, Earl Kitchener, Hess Street, Queen Victoria, Ryerson, Sir John A Macdonald, and Strathcona school communities. Members of community groups who provide supports in the West Hamilton community also participated. However, not all participants signed in so it is estimated that over 100 school stakeholders attended the event. Trustees, committee members, and HWDSB staff also attended to support the consultation.

The following is a high level summary of these conversations, highlighting common themes. Please refer to the verbatim notes for further information.

Summary of Findings

What do you think of Idea A? (No schools close, No boundary changes)

- Agree with / like the idea:
 - Children are happy at their current school
 - Current school is easily accessible / close to family home
 - Allows many students to walk to school
 - Idea A is least disruptive to children, families, and staff
 - This is good for vulnerable schools like Hess
 - Keep schools the same because changes are difficult for newcomers (e.g. language barrier, unfamiliarity with city)
 - Like the programs / services offered at the school (e.g. Hess school daycare)
 - Like smaller schools because of the smaller classes
 - Schools will remain community hubs if no changes are made (e.g. keep Hess as a community hub)
- Disagree with / dislike the idea:
 - Idea A is not acceptable

- Changes are needed to solve existing problems (e.g. inadequate play space at Hess, Strathcona, Queen Victoria)
- Idea A doesn't provide access to new building funds from the ministry
- Idea A doesn't address over/underutilization of facilities
 - Doesn't help with overcrowding issues (e.g. Ryerson, Earl Kitchener FI program)
- Idea A doesn't consider states of repair/disrepair of schools
 - Hess Street school will be very costly to repair/renovate
- Other comments:
 - Why is Idea A presented as an option if there is not enough funding available to do the needed renovations at all schools?

What do you think of Idea B? (Balancing Utilization and FI introduced at Bennetto)

- Agree with / like the idea:
 - Addresses overcrowding issues at some schools (e.g. Earl Kitchener, Central, Ryerson)
 - Like that all school remain open
 - Allows for schools to remain as community hubs
 - Changing boundaries and not schools makes sense
 - Like that vulnerable population at Hess Street will not be affected
 - This option allows for future growth
 - Like that FI will be offered at Bennetto with this option
 - Provides advantages for students from different socio-economic backgrounds
- Disagree with / dislike the idea:
 - Don't like the boundary changes
 - will be too disruptive for families (especially newcomers)
 - Doesn't solve overcrowding issues for all schools
 - Families will be negatively impacted; while all existing issues will not be solved
 - Funding implications
 - No Ministry funding will be provided for new build
 - Not likely to receive required funds to address renovation needs at all schools
- Other comments:
 - This option means there will be big changes for FI students
 - Do the boundary changes affect how many students can walk to school? Will Hess still be 100% walkable?
 - Need more information about what programs will change / be offered at each site with this option

What do you think of Idea C? (Hess/Strathcona JK-8 Merge (site TBD), FI at Bennetto)

- Agree with / like the idea:
 - Like the K-8 school model (e.g. helps keep siblings together)
 - Provides more options for social situations
 - Larger student body means more staff and more extracurricular activities for students
 - Like that this option will allow for use of Ministry funding for new build
 - Like the idea of having a new school building with new facilities
 - Addresses the aging facility problems at Hess Street
- Disagree with / dislike the idea:
 - Dislike K-8 school model (e.g. middle school model is better, keeps younger and older students separated)
 - Larger student body means there will be more problems
 - Proximity matters
 - Don't like this idea because not sure where new school will be located
 - Transportation costs are a concern
 - Funding should be used for renovations not rebuilds

- Other comments:
 - Option C is less favourable than B

What do you think of Idea D? (Hess/Strathcona JK-5 Merge (site TBD), 6-8 English at Ryerson, FI at Bennetto)

- Agree with / like the idea:
 - Like that Hess / Strathcona remain in the same general area
 - Like the JK-5 school model
 - Prefer smaller student populations
 - Safer for younger students to be separated from middle school students
- Disagree with / dislike the idea:
 - Add to overcrowding issues at Ryerson
 - Ryerson would need renovations to accommodate more students

Hello Sue,

Today is Monday, March 6th, and I am writing about two distinct issues relating to the HWDSB West Hamilton Accommodation Review. I would like for this correspondence to be shared with the working group in our next meeting on March 22nd.

Firstly, I feel that we have not covered this subject as thoroughly as we need to have done at this stage in the process. There is still a significant lack of understanding of our options within our group, and in the wider community. According to the Pupil Accommodation Review Timeline laid out in our binder, there must be "a minimum of 40 business days to a maximum of 60 business days between the first and final public meetings" - which gives us until April 4th to hold another public meeting.

Furthermore, I don't believe that one working group meeting after the final public meeting (if another one is not scheduled) will be enough to cover any and all concerns which may be raised by the public. I think it is a disservice to the wider community to imagine we can address all their concerns in one meeting.

I therefore propose that we add, at the very least, one more working group meeting after March 22nd, and preferably more than that - as well as another public meeting.

The second subject I wanted to raise is one that we have barely mentioned during our working group, but one that I think should be discussed. That is that we have been told - quite clearly and plainly - by staff that the HWDSB is underfunded in terms of regular maintenance and upkeep of the existing schools. Therefore, the only financially viable way to adequately accommodate Hamilton students is to continually "consolidate" schools.

This consolidation means that schools become larger and further apart. This is precisely the opposite of what parents, educators and students feel is good for the educational, emotional and physical well-being of students and their families. It is absurd on its face that the HWDSB continues to acquiesce to this Provincial funding model.

Just about every ARC that has taken place in Hamilton has involved controversial school closures. Many of these closures have rightly been met with angry protests from teachers and families. The role of the HWDSB is to provide the best possible education and educational environment for students, and the best workplace possible for educational staff. This role is not fulfilled by simply being a conduit for the unreasonable demands of the Provincial government.

I urge Trustees and HWDSB staff in the strongest possible terms to cease with this consolidation practice and to fight the Province if necessary to change their funding model. If our schools were well maintained, this sort of precipitous review process and dramatic change would not be necessary, and could be replaced by a gradual, gentle and occasional tweaking of catchment boundaries.

I thank you for your consideration.

Comment, re: West Hamilton City Accommodation Review (AR)

Superintendent Dunlop and members of the accommodation review committee (ARC), the Bennetto Parent Council would like to take this opportunity to comment on the pupil accommodation review (PAR) currently underway for 9 schools, including ours, in West Hamilton City.

Specifically, we would like to express our opposition to closing schools unless there is a compelling rationale and broad consensus for doing so. We also wish to convey our support for opening a new French Immersion (FI) program to serve students in the northern and eastern parts of the AR study area.

As HWDSB staff, trustees, and ARC members may be aware, the North End is in the midst of significant change. It is unclear if the potential for future growth in families with children has been adequately incorporated in the projections being relied upon in the PAR. We are aware that most, if not all, of the neighbourhoods included in the PAR are in a similar position, but we'd like to highlight and emphasize our situation.

In recent decades, the City of Hamilton has invested in major parks in the West Harbour and North End residents have fought for a traffic management plan to calm traffic to ensure that as large-scale residential developments on Pier 8 and Barton-Tiffany proceed our neighbourhood remains walkable and safe, especially for children. There is also significant renovation activity occurring and the area is viewed as a desirable place to raise children.

It is unclear if the changes underway are being reflected in data or enrollment numbers as the changes being experienced are multi-faceted and in the immediate term some families are being displaced due to rising rents and the decision by CityHousing Hamilton to leave many family-sized units in its Jamesville complex vacant in advance of what is being characterized as a revitalization project that involve significant residential intensification.

For these reasons we believe the AR should be cautious in “right-sizing” capacity in West Hamilton City, particularly with regard to those schools located in neighbourhoods that are part of the planning area covered by the West Harbour Secondary Plan (i.e. Setting Sail).

It is our understanding that HWDSB trustees approved a report last summer that recommended the phased opening of a new FI program at Bennetto Elementary School.

We support this as an outcome of the AR as it would not only increase enrollment at our school to ensure the facility remains well utilized, but will also improve access to FI for students in our catchment and those of nearby schools, which serve social and economically diverse communities.

The addition of FI would complement other initiatives (recent and underway) to make the Bennetto Elementary School more of a community hub and support and enhance the learning environment for students and staff. Two examples among many: over the last couple of years we have directed considerable effort toward planning and fundraising for outdoor play area improvements and have been working in collaboration with No.9 (Toronto-based non-profit arts and design organization) to develop a

series of small projects to make this achievable as resources permit; and the addition of before and after school childcare run by the Jamesville Children's Centre using one of the kindergarten classrooms.

We'd like to express our appreciation to HWDSB staff and members of the ARC for their efforts to ensure that students (our future) are well-served by this process.

To HWDSB Trustees and Accommodation Review Committee,

Ahead of our meeting on Wednesday night I want to summarize some of my thoughts regarding our work to date.

We have heard clearly from the public and committee members priorities such as walkable schools, schools that function as community hubs, and well maintained facilities/play spaces. This is what I want for my daughter at Hess St School and for all students at the 9 schools in this area.

However, I'm disappointed that poor decisions made in the past decade and incomplete enrollment projections are restricting our ability to develop a vision for what we want our schools to look like in 25 years. The fact that 3 schools have been rebuilt since 2006 with capacity for ~800 students while today each of these schools is underutilized reveals poor HWDSB planning. The admission from HWDSB staff that the new developments at Pier 7/8 and Barton-Tiffany are not included in future enrollment projections also inhibits our planning ability.

Notwithstanding these concerns, I have always felt that the initial option to close Hess and bus students to Bennetto was ill-conceived. My preference has been to keep all 9 schools open. The current enrollment in the 9 schools is a healthy 82%. Redistributing the catchment boundaries so that schools are more balanced (rather than some at 63%, while others are at 120%) will be difficult, but it will maintain the current walkability, will not negatively impact existing communities, and it will preserve the existing local neighbourhood schools.

I recognize that financial constraints will likely be one of the most critical factors in this decision-making process, and as a result I think the second best option is this:

- To build a new Kindergarten to Grade 8 school on the Sir John A Macdonald soccer field to replace Hess St School and Strathcona

While not perfect, this will provide a new school and maintain walkable communities for a large majority.

I'd like to conclude with some recommendations for the next Pupil Accommodation Review process:

- a) Include more information in the initial report rather than providing additional information to the committee mid-way into the process. Information such as which schools are designated or listed as heritage sites, already proposed French Immersion boundary adjustments and bus information.
- b) Provide as an appendix to the initial report a summary of special programs that occur at each school (rather than verbally presenting this at Meeting #2 and not including it in the minutes).
- c) Explain more clearly the different "pots of money" that funding comes from. The fact that the current provincial funding model is flawed and completely separates transportation costs, school capital renewal costs, and new school construction costs should be stated up-front.
- d) Explain more clearly what "On The Ground" (OTG) capacity is and how it's calculated
- e) Make public the current "Learning Opportunities Plan" rather than treating this as "sensitive confidential information".

Expanded Option for PAR 2017 West Hamilton City Elementary Schools

by Nadine Bernacki, March 9th, 2017:

SUMMARY:

Move Central boundaries to transfer some Central and Ryerson students to Queen Victoria School to reduce population pressure on Central and Ryerson.

Move French Immersion boundary to anything outside of the new boundary encircling EK and Central Schools. Second French Immersion program to be started at Bennetto.

Move the Ryerson boundary to include only EK and Central School catchment areas.

Close Hess and Strathcona and build a JK-8 school, with 500 pupil places maximum, on a site to be determined (Central Park, Victoria Park, SJAM site, or other site) to have new buildings which meet benchmark and accessibility requirements, keep close communities and siblings together, reduce renewal costs, and accommodate generous play spaces. A community hub with a recreation centre (and an indoor pool with hot pool) is also needed and could be created for these neighbourhoods.

Close Central, Earl Kitchener, and Ryerson and build 2 JK-8 schools to replace them on sites TBD (Ryerson site, Earl Kitchener site with additional lands, Chedoke Golf Course site, other tbd)... to have new buildings which meet benchmark and accessibility and safety requirements, keeping close communities and siblings together, reducing renewal costs, and accommodating generous play spaces.

Move SAGE and SAGE Quest programs together to Bennetto school to help optimize utilization at that site and to keep the SAGE siblings together at one school and to not create a school larger than 500 at Strathcona & Hess.

Move Hess/Strathcona eastern boundary to Bay Street to transfer pupils to Dr. Davey to reduce size of new Hess/Strathcona school to a maximum 500 pupil places.

Using SCC money to meet the renewal and benchmark items via the consolidation of schools will allow the board to fully renew Bennetto school and bring all of the schools in our area up to date with available funds from other Ministry of Education funds.

Use proceeds from any sale of surplus lands or buildings and/or any other money we can get our hands on to build a new school at Mars Ave and Cheever Streets in the Keith neighbourhood to accommodate 500 students (JK-8) with at least 6 acres adjoining the community park and buying out the auto recycling place and the empty former Studebaker lot. (Hopefully this can be redeveloped residential around the new school site).

Redistribute the boundaries of the Dr. Davey, Queen Victoria, C. Wever, and Keith Schools as it makes the most community and walkable sense to accommodate approximately 520 students each. Seek out community partners to take over the surplus space specifically in the buildings of Dr. Davey, Q. Vic., and C. Wever as needed and possible to improve utilization over the four schools. Government of Ontario funding is available for development of community hubs.

PART ONE:

Earl Kitchener, Central, and Ryerson Catchment Boundaries

1. Move eastern catchment boundary for Central to James St., northern boundary to Main St.

- *students will not have to cross James Street*
- *students will not have to cross Main Street after LRT construction (probably less than two students affected)*
- *lines up boundary with Earl Kitchener northern boundary (makes sense)*
- *reduce population pressure at Central AND Ryerson, estimated 50 students from Central and 30 from Ryerson to Queen Victoria*
Central: $304-50=254/283=90\%$

2. Ryerson 6-8 catchment boundaries moved to include new Central boundaries

- *makes sense to keep Central and EK kids together and not have to bring in students from other areas when the school is already overfull.*

Ryerson impact: $410-30=380/343=110\%$

Queen Victoria impact: $557+50(k-5)+30(6-8)=637, 637/758=84\%$

PART TWO:

French Immersion Boundary for EK and Ryerson

3. With respect to new catchment boundaries listed above move French Immersion Boundary for any students residing outside of the EK and Central catchments to be accommodated at a new French Immersion program location at Bennetto school

- *creates greater convenience for students in North End of City to participate in French Immersion*
- *relieves student population pressure from EK and Ryerson*

EK Impact: $561-54=507/548=93\%$

Ryerson Impact: $380-15=365/343=106\%$

Bennetto Impact: $497+54(k-5 FI)+15(6-8 FI)=566/744=76\%$

PART THREE:

Strathcona and Hess Schools

4. Merge the populations of Strathcona and Hess St. schools into a new JK-8 school on a TBD site with generous play space and green space, (former locations as possible community hubs/rec. Ctrs)

- *keep Hess Students in walkable Strathcona neighbourhood where they live*
- *create generous outdoor play spaces for both Hess and Strathcona students, both which are currently lacking*
- *create space for community hub and recreation centre in Strathcona neighbourhoods*
- *improved facilities for both Strathcona and Hess students*
- *improved ability of HWDSB to financially sustain these two schools as well as others*
- *creates opportunity for community cohesion across socio-economic backgrounds by including more diversity into both school populations*
- *ideally keep this school to less than 500 students to help create cohesion in diversity at this school*

Strathcona Impact: $188-188=0$ - closed

Hess St. Impact: $346-346=0$ - closed

New School for Strathcona and Hess Students

New School: $188(K-5)+346(K-8)=534$

PART FOUR: **Other boundary and program movement**

5. Grade 6-8 students from former Strathcona catchment at Ryerson to transfer to New Strathcona/Hess school

- *makes sense to keep the JK-8 children from Hess with the JK-8 children from Strathcona – it could detrimentally affect kids who have bonded to each other to split them up in Grade six.*




Possible new EK school with additions



Possible suggested location for new Keith School





Possible location for new Hess and Strathcona school





Dear Superintendent and members of the committee:

On behalf of the Beasley Neighbourhood Association, please accept this letter as a statement of support for options available to the Accommodation Review Committee that maintain the ongoing operation of the nine (9) existing public schools run by the HWDSB, namely: Central Elementary, Ryerson Middle, Earl Kitchener Elementary, Strathcona Elementary, Hess Street Elementary, Bennetto Elementary, Cathy Wever Elementary, Dr Edgar Davey Elementary & Queen Victoria Elementary.

In addition, we also explicitly oppose any option that does not maintain a Hess Street Elementary School (at its current or another nearby location) for the following reasons:

- (1) Hess Street Elementary serves a diverse student body that includes new Canadians and children from disadvantaged socioeconomic backgrounds;
- (2) The ability to safely walk to school in localized neighbourhoods (i.e. without crossing major roads) has positive impacts on both the health and well-being of schoolchildren;
- (3) The medium- and long-term effects of changing demographics in Hamilton's rapidly changing downtown does not appear to have been adequately assessed through your process, and;
- (4) Given the Beasley neighbourhood's improving experience with a Community Hub model at Dr. Davey Elementary, a model promoted by the Province and the Premier herself, we believe that depriving a community of a potential hub is a disservice to those residents.

We would be happy to discuss anything of these concerns further, and we wish you the best in making the a balanced and just decision for the lower city's families.
