HWDSB LAUNCHES NEW MULTI-YEAR STRATEGIC PLAN

On Wednesday, January 17, 2024, Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board (HWDSB) launched a Multi-Year Strategic Plan (MYSP) and Board Improvement Plan. HWDSB's five-year MYSP and Board Improvement Plan will guide the work of the school board from 2023 to 2028 and was created through extensive community consultation.

HWDSB created a new Mission to guide the five-year MYSP:

To ensure that every student experiences a sense of belonging and engages in dynamic learning to reach their potential and build their own future.

In addition to the new Mission, the MYSP includes five Strategic Directions designed to enhance student belonging and achievement. The Strategic Directions are:

- Upholding Human Rights, Safety & Well-Being
- **Providing Equitable Quality Education**
- Collaborating with Students, Families & Communities
- **Building a Sustainable Education System**
- Reinforcing Indigenous Educational Wellness & Reconciliation

It is never too late to register for Kindergarten for September 2024 School year but please do so ASAP.




Students who will turn 4 years of age by December 31, 2024 are eligible for JK, while students who will turn 5 are eligible for

REPORT CARDS



1st term report cards have been sent and we are into term two, the message you want to send is to respect their hard work as every student has made some progress in their learning. Praising kids for following through when things get difficult, for making a sustained effort, for trying things they're not sure they can do successfully; can all

help teach them the pleasure of pushing themselves. DO stay positive. Find something to praise initially, even if it's only to comment on the slight improvement in your child's grades or how well they get along with their classmates. If the marks aren't stellar, but your child has worked hard and tried their very best, they deserve recognition for what they achieved. Make sure to focus on the effort they put in and commitment they showed instead of the outcome or the final grade.

LIBRARY BOOKS

With the rest of the money raised from our MacMillan's fundraiser last year, funds from Scholastic Book Fair and Indigo gift cards, we were recently able to purchase about 100 new books for our library as we had to purge and get rid of quite a few outdated ones.

We recently had personnel from the Board in to revamp our library as we are moving back to the Dewey Decimal Classification System. This is the system that you usually see when you visit the Public Library. Most schools have already done this.

HAVE YOU CHANGED YOUR CONTACT INFORMATION?

Updating contact information in schools is important for a variety of reasons. It ensures that parents and guardians can be reached in case of an emergency or for important updates about the school. It also helps schools to stay in touch with students and families, and to keep track of who is authorized to pick up a student from school.



There are a few different ways that schools may update contact information. Some schools may ask parents and guardians to fill out a form at the beginning of the school year with their current contact information. Others may send out a notification to families asking them to review and update their contact information online.

Regardless of the method used, it is important for parents and guardians to keep their contact information up to date. This may include their home and mobile phone numbers, email address, and physical address. It is also a good idea to provide the school with the contact information for at least two emergency contacts in case the primary contact is not available.

By keeping contact information up to date, schools can ensure that they have a reliable way to reach families and guardians, and families can be confident that they will be contacted in case of an emergency or important update.

THE IMPORTANCE OF REGULAR SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

It's a fact that students who attend school regularly learn more and are more successful in school than students who do not. Parents who make regular school attendance or being at school on time a priority also are helping their children learn to accept responsibility. And that's an important lesson for a successful life. Attendance patterns are formed early in life.

Children who develop good attendance habits in the early grades will be more likely to continue them throughout their school career. That's important, because students who miss school (whether it be the



entire day or a part of the day), miss out on carefully planned sequences of instruction. They miss out on active learning experiences and class participation. They miss out on the opportunity to ask questions. What Parents Can Do:

- Let your child know that you expect him/her to attend school every day. Explain that, just as you have a job, it's their job to go to school and learn.
- Get involved with your child's school. When he/she sees you in the halls or the classrooms they better understand the importance of school.
- The Board requires a parent notification to all families when students reach 10 and 15 days of absences (excused or non-excused).

We appreciate your support in having our students in school and on time.

Reading at Home

Talking about books and reading is an important part of your child's learning. Below are some questions to help you get started in conversations about books and reading. It is important that your child read daily at home. The questions below will support the things we are doing at school.

- Why did you choose this book?
- What do you think will happen next? Which part of the text makes you think that?
- Does this book remind you of anything that has ever happened to you?
- What have you been wondering as you read this?
- Does this book make you think of anything else you have read?
- Were there any words or phrases in your reading that you really liked? Which ones?
- What had been your favorite part of the book so far? Why?
- Was there a part of the book that surprised you? Why?
- Would you like to read another book by this same author? Why of why not?
- Can you think of someone else you know who would like this book? Why?
- Was this book too hard, too easy, or just right for you? How do you know?
- Were there any places in the book that had you confused? Did you reread to help you understand?
