

NATIONAL INDIGENOUS HISTORY MONTH

June is National Indigenous History Month in Canada, an opportunity to learn about the unique cultures, traditions and experiences of First Nations, Inuit and Métis. It's a time to honour the stories, achievements and resilience of Indigenous Peoples, who have lived on this land since time immemorial and whose presence continues to impact the evolving Canada. The House of Commons designated June as National Aboriginal History Month in 2009. The name was changed to National Indigenous History Month in 2017.

The best way to gain a deeper understanding of First Nations, Inuit and Métis experiences is through their own voices. Enjoy Indigenous storytelling by picking up a book, attending a show, watching a movie or listening to music from Indigenous artists. You can also check out the GC Indigenous Instagram account to learn more about inspiring Indigenous women, 2SLGBTQ+ people, environmentalists, artists, activists, scientists and researchers.



PRIDE MONTH

In 1995 Canada's supreme court finally considered sexual orientation a prohibited ground of discrimination in the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms. LGBTQ+ members who faced, hate, exclusion, and often lived in fear for their lives long fought for these rights and believed in a better future. Pride is the promotion of dignity, equity and increased visibility for 2SLGBTQIA+ peoples. It is a celebration of life, rights, dignity, equity and difference.



The month of June is recognized as Pride Month in Canada. In support of our commitment to providing a positive school climate for all students, staff, and community, all HWDSB Board offices and schools will fly the Progress Pride flag alongside with the Canadian flag during the month of June.

NOTIFYING THE SCHOOL ABOUT ABSENCES

Reminder to parents and guardians to use Safe Arrival or call the school office before 8:55 a.m., if your child is going to be late or absent from school due to an illness, appointment or a family holiday. It is the policy of the HWDSB to contact parents in the event that the student does not arrive at school and the school has not been notified about an absence or late arrival. Please understand that not all students begin their day with their homeroom teacher so messages regarding attendance that are given to the homeroom teacher do not always make it to the office. A message in School Arrival; note to the office or a call to our 24hr answering machine (905-387-5655) will ensure that student absences will be received. Thank you in advance for your co-operation with us in this important daily activity to make sure that your child arrives at school safely.

***We would also ask that if your child needs to be excused early from school, that he/she brings a note to the office in the morning so we can have them properly signed out and ready for when they are to be picked up. This will help everyone to be organized and on time as much as possible. Thank you. ***

UPDATING CONTACT INFORMATION

MENTAL WELLNESS

THE IMPORTANCE OF A SUMMER SAFETY PLAN

A summer safety plan can have a tremendous impact on a student's mental health during the summer. Daily routines and structure are important for development as they create a sense of stability and allow children to grow socially, emotionally and academically. The school environment provides this inherently during the school year, but the structured environment disappears once summer begins. A summer plan can address specific stressors and empower students to plan ahead with strategies to support their mental health and well-being over the summer break.



Summer Safety Plan Essentials

A well-thought-out summer safety plan is specific to the individual and includes the following:

- Daily Schedule: Create a schedule that includes daily routines such as mealtimes, chores, exercise, family meals, social interactions and time spent online.
- Safe Places Create a list of places where the student feels safe, calm and secure such as their own room, a park close to home, or a trusted neighbor's house.
- Support System Provide phone numbers of individuals willing and able to support your student.
- Fun Activities Include stress-relieving activities like swimming, hiking, playing games or watching uplifting movies or shows.
- Identifying Stressors: Identify potential summer stressors (e.g., being home alone, bullying, friend issues or changes in the family) and outline strategies for coping.
- Warning Signs and Coping Methods: Document warning signs of emotional distress and list ways to cope such as deep breathing, listening to music or going for a walk.
