MIDDLE ← Interview 2-3 witnesses or experts who can help answer: •How did this happen? • Why did this happen? ← Indicate what will happen END next (tomorrow/next week) as a result of the event. REVIEW ☐ Is the first sentence based on the headline? ☐ Have I shared the most important information at the beginning of my report and the least important at the end? ☐ Have I removed words that reveal my opinion/bias? ☐ Have I used all the lines provided? ☐ Have I proofread my writing? Have I used capitals, commas, quotation marks and transition words effectively? ☐ Have I <u>quoted</u> at least two witnesses or experts who can tell me about what happened? ☐ Have I introduced quotes properly by stating the witness' name and relation to the event? O Have I used paragraphs?

- 1. Think about the question but don't answer it yet. Brainstorm before answering Yes or No.
- 2. Use a brainstorming strategy like S.H.E.M.P.











Ask the question again, focusing your thinking in each of the SHEMP categories

3. Choose a side: Yes or No.

Choose a side based on your best examples.

4. Choose the THREE best categories.

Organize your brainstorming. Choose the three best S.H.E.M.P. categories for your answer. Each category will evolve into its own body paragraph in your essay.



This selection suggests that some First Nations peoples in northern Ontario struggle. One reason is that they do not have clean water.



REMEMBER THE NEWS REPORT FORMAT



NEVER REVEAL YOUR OPINION!



The News Report

Remember your role as reporter.

Be like a <u>camera</u>. Report only the information you collect from witnesses and experts who are directly involved in the event or can tell you about it.

Be <u>objective</u>. Never share your <u>personal opinion</u>. Don't describe something as wonderful, terrible or fantastic. Do not congratulate anyone. Remain <u>neutral</u> and <u>unbiased</u>.

Do not use <u>personal pronouns</u> (I, we, my, you, our). Use these words only when someone else says them in a quote.

Watch your tone.

Your tone should be <u>serious</u> and <u>professional</u>. Do not use humour or sarcasm. Do not use rhetorical questions or exclamation marks.

Record Number of Students Pass the Literacy Test

<u>Yesterday, Saltfleet High School in Stoney Creek found out that a</u> record number of students passed this year's the literacy test.

According to Vice-Principal Mark Harris, over 80% of writers were successful. That is a 6% increase from last year.

"This year students prepared more than any other year," he said. "Ms. Mills and Ms. Corrigan ran a practice test. Students had the chance to see what the real test would look and feel like. Many students also attended the after-school literacy prep with Ms. Chudak, Mr. France, and Ms. Apanasowicz. The night before the test, almost 100 students got extra help at the Cocoa and Cram event, held at Saltfleet.

When asked why he and so many of his friends passed, Grade 10 student Joseph Szabo commented: "Honestly, I just think that we studied and prepared. There was an assembly a few days before the test, and we got study booklets. My friends Connor, Tyson, and I got together to review the tips. We practiced writing sample News Reports and Opinion Essays. It seems like all the work we put in was worth it!"


Think about the question but don't answer it yet.

Your answer will be the essay's thesis.

Brainstorm using a strategy like S.H.E.M.P.

It's difficult to <u>brainstorm</u> when you don't have a focus. <u>S.H.E.M.P.</u> gives you a focus. It stands for:

Generate examples for <u>each category</u>. Some of your examples will support the answer Yes and some will support the answer No.



REMEMBER ADVICE FOR ANSWERING MULTIPLE CHOICE QUESTIONS



TIPS Reading Selection Multiple Choice

BEFORE YOU READ

1. Read the questions first.

Reading the questions first will help you establish a <u>purpose</u>. Read the selection with the questions in mind.

AS YOU READ

2. Underline important information.

Underline keywords in the reading that you recognize from the questions.

AFTER YOU READ

3. Read the entire question.

Read the whole question. Don't jump to the options because you think you know.

4. Answer in your mind first.

Before reading the options, try to answer without looking. Then read the options.

5. Eliminate wrong answers

Eliminate answers that you are certain are wrong. Cross them out.

6. Choose the most correct answer

Several answers may seem correct but only one is right. Look for the best answer.

7. Check your answers before making a final decision.

Return to the selection to check your answers. Some information will be "on the page" and some will be "between the lines". Make an inference.

8. Never leave a question unanswered.

When you've done all of the above and still don't know, make an educated guess.
