







- 40 hours of Community Service

Online Graduation Requirement

Two-credit online graduation requirement can be earned in the following ways:

- Selecting eLearning as a day school student at Westdale SS
- Summer School

Current Grade 11 students are credited with having earned one eLearning credit through remote learning during COVID-19 school closure

IMPORTANT

Families can now opt out of the Ministry of Education's online learning graduation requirement. The "eLearning Opt Out for Families" form can be found in Parent Portal. There is currently no expiration date or deadline to submit

DIPLOMA REQUIREMENTS – 30 CREDITS

18 COMPULSORY CREDITS TO INCLUDE:

THESE 15 CREDITS:

- 4 credits in English (1 credit per grade)*
- 3 credits in mathematics (1 credit in Grade 11 or 12)
- 2 credits in science
- 1 credit in Canadian history
- 1 credit in Canadian geography
- 1 credit in the arts
- 1 credit in health and physical education
- 1 credit in French as a second language
- 0.5 credit in career studies
- 0.5 credit in civics

PLUS ONE CREDIT FROM EACH OF THE FOLLOWING GROUPS:

Group 1: One additional credit in English, or French as a second language, ** or a Native language, or a classical or an international language, or social sciences and the humanities, or Canadian and world studies, or guidance and career education, or cooperative education***

Group 2: One additional credit in health and physical education, or the arts, or business studies, or French as a second language, ** or cooperative education***

Group 3: One additional credit in science (Grade 11 or 12), or technological education (Grades 9 - 12), or French as a second language, ** or computer studies, or cooperative education***

In addition to the compulsory credits, students must complete 12 optional credits+, 40 hours of community involvement, and the provincial literacy requirement.

[†]The 12 optional credits may include up to 4 credits earned through approved dual credit courses.









^{*}A maximum of 3 credits in English as a second language (ESL) or English literacy development (ELD) may be counted towards the 4 compulsory credits in English, but the fourth must be a credit earned for a Grade 12 compulsory English course.

^{**}In groups 1. 2. & 3, a maximum of 2 credits in French as a second language can count as compulsory credits, one from group 1 & one from either group 2 or group 3. ***A maximum of 2 credits in cooperative education can count as compulsory credits.



PATHWAYS

- Types of Grade 11 Courses:
 - College (C)
 - University (U)
 - College/University (M)
 - Workplace (E)
 - Open (O)



PATHWAYS

- Applied courses lead to College (C) and college/university (M) courses in Grade 11
- Academic courses lead to College/University (M) or University (U) courses in Grade 11
- Locally Developed courses lead to E (essential/workplace) level courses in Grade 11
- Set yourself up for success; no pathway is truly out of reach



MATH PATHWAYS

Selecting the right math course depends on what you plan to do after high school:

- MTH1W to MPM2D to MCR3U
 - Leads to MHF4U or MCV4U or MDM4U in Grade 12
 - Required for programs like Engineering, Sciences,
 - Business, Mathematics, Kinesiology, etc.
- MTH1W to MPM2D or MFM2P to MCF3M
 - Leads to MDM4U
 - Useful for programs that require only one 4U math, or some College programs that have restrictions for MAP4Cturiosity creativity possib



MATH PATHWAYS

- MTH1W to MPM2D or MFM2P to MCF3M
 - Leads to MCT4C
 - Required for college health & technology programs
- MTH1W to MFM2P to MBF3C
 - Leads to MAP4C
 - MBF3C is suitable for some college programs; you will need to check specific program requirements
- MAT1L to MAT2L to MEL3E
 - Leads to MEL4E Mathematics for everyday life





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Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program

- Start your chosen career and train as a registered apprentice while enrolled in high school (Grade 11)
- On the job training for students who like to learn by doing
- Signed apprentice = Paid employment + 4 credits + apprenticeship hours
- Over 130 careers including Early Childhood Educator, Chef, Carpenter, Electrician, Hairstylist, Baker, Butcher
- See a Cooperative Education Teacher or Guidance Counsellor for info

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Accelerated OYAP

- Program that a Grade 12 student can participate in during semester 2 of their graduating year
- Student is registered as an apprentice
- Student can finish their Level 1 Apprenticeship Training at Mohawk College
- Student earns hours towards their apprenticeship
- After completing Accelerated OYAP, a student is ready to enter Level 2 of their apprenticeship

- Level 1 Automotive Service Technician Apprenticeship
- Level 1 Cook Apprenticeship
- Level 1 Child and Youth Worker Apprenticeship
- Level 1 Early Childhood Educator Apprenticeship

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Cooperative Education (Coop)

- Earn 2 credits in a half day coop placement all morning OR all afternoon in any semester (COO3OE)
- Earn 4 credits in a full day coop placement either semester 1 (COOFT1) OR in semester 2 (COOFT2)
- Requires application and interview

Central Coop Placements

- These are competitive placements that all HWDSB students can apply for
 - Hamilton Police Service, Cable 14, Hamilton Health Sciences, Art Gallery of Hamilton, ABLE Living, Crown Attorney's Office, Hamilton International Airport, Digital Canaries etc.
 - Require interview and additional application

Benefits

Pursuing an SHSM enables students to ...

- 1. Customize their secondary school education to suit their interests and talents;
- 2. Develop specialized knowledge and skills that are valued by the sector or post secondary education institutions;
- 3. Earn credits that are recognized by the sector and postsecondary education institution;
- 4. Gain sector-specific and career-relevant certification and training;
- Identify, explore, and refine career goals and make informed decisions about their post-secondary destination;
- 6. Remain flexible, with the option to shift between pathways should their goals and plans change;






Achieving SHSM

- FOUR Major Credits (at least one Gr. 11 and one Gr. 12)
- ONE Additional Credit as determined by SHSM
- Grade 12 English
- Some SHSM require Grade 12 math check with Guidance or SHSM teacher
- Certifications organized by SHSM teacher
- Reach-ahead experience
- Experiential learning
- TWO credits of co-op; placement must be related to your SHSM sector

SHSM: Getting Started

- Complete the SHSM Interest form located in the Guidance Hub Course
- Select at least two courses in Grade 11 that contribute to you earning your SHSM;
- Plan ahead to determine when you will complete co-op requirement
- See your SHSM lead or Guidance counsellor with any questions

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SUMMER SCHOOL

- Use summer school to
 - Get ahead in credits
 - Make up missed credits
 - Upgrade your foundational skills and upgrade your mark
- If you plan to take ANY COMPULSORY COURSE (Civics, Careers, English, Math, Science etc.) in summer school, you still must select it in Xello so you can submit your options
- Next, you will email your Guidance Counsellor to let them know what course you want removed from Xello so you can take it in summer school and what course you want added to Xello to replace the course you are taking in summer school
- Summer school course info will be available June 1
