



Daniel Stepaniuk, or Mr. Stepaniuk as Westmount students often refer to him as not only serves as a Vice-Principal of Westmount Secondary but a LieutenantColonel for the Canadian Army Reserves.

Preparing for his next volunteer trip, Mr. Stepaniuk will be travelling to Germany to aid Ukrainian military officers.

"The people in Ukraine need a lot of help. I was asked to work with a team of people in order to focus in the area of professional military education," he told the Gazette.

Mr. Stepaniuk explained the worldwide help for Ukrainian military officers, primarily from western nations.

"I believe that there is this push, this desire of western nations in order to provide this level of professional military education to senior Ukrainian military leaders."

His journey as a member of the Canadian Army Reserves began when he was only 18 years of age, looking for an adventure and a challenge.

"I joined the Canadian Army Reserves when I was 18 years old. As a young person, I was seeking adventure, challenging myself physically and mentally."

It started off with Scouts, and as Mr.



Stepaniuk's interest in the forces grew, so did his responsibilities.

"I spent a lot of time in Scouts when I was a young person... That type of adventure appealed to me. I would go off to the armouries, [learning] infantry skills, camouflage and concealment."

But as his career has evolved, so have his focuses within the Forces.

"As I got older, I really started to focus on the surface aspects of Canadian Forces and how we can serve our community, serve our country, and make a difference in the lives of vulnerable people around the world."

And with this trip to Germany, Mr. Stepaniuk wants to focus on the future of Ukraine and how it can grow as a nation, despite the Russian invasion.

"Think of it in terms of post-conflict. What does the Ukraine of the future look like? What are some of the skills and attributes that they're going to need in the future?"

But a trip like this requires many attributes, including bravery and sacrifice. For Mr. Stepaniuk, these traits are of immense importance.

"Hopefully, in my current role...I won't require too much bravery. Certainly, I can tell you, my colleagues and arms around the world demonstrate bravery every day."

And although Mr. Stepaniuk will be sacrificing a lot at home for this trip, he understands it is a necessity.

"This mission, I will be away from my family for seven months...missing all manner of family celebrations so that I can be in a place where I can help many people and that is a great honour." What an honourable sacrifice indeed.


