The Detrimental Effects of ConocoPhillips' Willow Project

Oil and gas exploration has undeniably been one of humanity's most significant projects. Recent awareness of ConocoPhillips' "Willow Project" has caused a heavy uproar from environmentalists all over the globe.

The Willow Project is a colossal and lengthy oil drilling plan on Alaska's North Slope

in the National Petroleum Reserve. Dating back to 2020, the Trump Administration approved this transaction until chief judge




Sharon Gleason noticed the lack of environmental analysis behind the project. On March 13, 2023, the Biden Administration approved this project yet again. This decision enraged many viewers as it betrayed Biden's previous campaign promise to end new oil and gas drilling on public lands and waters. Even with political authorization, the project cannot commence due to upcoming legal challenges. Environmental law groups like Earthjustice are seeking an injunction to put a stop to this. Legal action could delay the process and make it much more difficult for the oil to reach the market.

The Willow Project is meant to produce jobs, enhance energy production, and allow the country to stray away from foreign oil. However, this plan will also heavily impact nearby wildlife habitats and cause a major food shortage for Alaska Native communities. The project would also release roughly 278 tonnes of greenhouse gas into the atmosphere, furthering our ongoing climate change crisis. The Arctic warms about 4 times faster than the rest of the globe, and the Willow Project would cause the polar ice sheets to melt rapidly.

Although the results of the project would benefit the economy and government revenue, we must value our earth. With activism blaring voices of reason, it becomes more difficult to conduct these sorts of projects and less difficult to preserve the planet. COMIC
