

Identification, Placement and Review Committee *Parent/Guardian Resource*

What is an IPRC?

- The Identification, Placement and Review Committee (IPRC) is a school board committee that decides whether your child is exceptional and the type of placement that will build on your child's strengths. Ministry of Education Regulation 181/98 governs the IPRC process.

Did you know?

IPRC is an acronym. Each letter is explained:

- **I = Identification:** Specific health or medical documentation is used to determine if a child is identified as exceptional, according to categories and definitions provided by the Ministry of Education.
- **P = Placement:** The physical location where your child attends school. Options include regular class or self-contained class. The committee may also recommend an application to a Provincial School (where relevant).
- **R = Review:** A meeting held once a year to review student progress and determine if the exceptionality and placement are still needed.
- **C = Committee:** The Committee with parental input makes the decision about whether a child is exceptional and their program placement.

What is your role?

- Share information about your child's strengths, needs, interests, as well as health and medical documentation.
- Talk to school staff about whether an IPRC is required.
- Attend, participate in and understand the IPRC process and decisions made about your child.
- Understand that you may request regular class placement in your child's neighbourhood school.
- Ask your child's Principal any questions you may have about IPRCs.
