- School visits this month were related to transitions with the focus to be to walk and talk in the schools that are undergoing transitions. The Director visited Delta, SJAM, Collegiate, Queen's Ranger, Ancaster Senior, and Fessenden.
- Reflecting on a very difficult budget development process, the Director shared information about the

 students and school-based staffing reductions.

Dear Minister,

We, the Strathcona School Council, are writing to express our concern regarding the changes to public education being proposed by your government. You have spoken often about the need for a Parents' Bill of Rights in Ontario's public education system, but we also believe that we, the parents and politicians, have collective *responsibilities* to our public education system. As a School Council, our purpose is:

through the active participation of parents, to improve pupil achievement and to enhance the accountability of the education system to parents. O. Reg. 612/00, s. 2 (1)." Education Act Ontario Regulation 612/00

Your government ran on the platform 'For The People'. However, by targeting public education to balance the budget, you have shown us that young people are not included in the 'people' for whom your government claims to be working.

High-quality, fully-funded and equitable public education is what we demand because it is what our kids deserve. Specifically, we want:

- A fully-funded public education system that includes low class caps, excellent needs-support, no mandatory e-learning, and well-maintained buildings.
- Funding that provides equitable enrichment opportunities across the system and reduces the burden on school-based fundraising.
- An inclusive curriculum and respect for the diversity of our students and educators.

The systems we need require more, not less, funding. We will press your government on these issues as part of our responsibility to hold the education system accountable. We will join voices with neighbouring schools to build strong support for the excellent education all students in Ontario need.

A. 2019-20 Budget Development

Staff reviewed the key items that have occurred to date and shared information on two Ministry memos that were released on April 26, 2019:

- B14:2019 Grant for Student Needs (GSN) Funding for 2019-10
- B15:2019 2019-20 Priorities and Partnerships Fund

These memos provide high level information related to both the funding sources. HWDSB specific data comes to the Board via the Technical Paper and the release of the Education Financial Information System (EFIS) forms which is expected within the next few weeks. Staff will use this information to review the assumptions that were made and review the preliminary budget position. The Priorities and Partnerships Fund (PPF) replaces the former Education Program Other (EPO) funding. All this information is being released several weeks later than in previous years and the final date for filing the 2019-20 budget estimates with the Ministry of Education has been extended to July 31.

Once Staff receive the Technical Paper they will be able to determine the Board's allocations and finalize the 2019-20 Budget Position. Staff will continue to review expenditures with Executive Council and bring recommendations to the Finance and Facilities Committee. Staff are cautiously optimistic that since the original budget position was created using very conservative estimates that the Board will be in a position to add back some of the reductions already made.

Recommended Action:

That the election of Ahona Mehdi, student at Westmount and Cameron Prosic, student at Sir John A. Macdonald, to the position of Student Trustee be confirmed for the term of office August I 2019 to July 31 2020.

Rationale/Benefits:

Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board requires that two Student Trustees be elected to the Board to serve for a term of one year. Each Student Trustee participates in the deliberations and decision-making of all matters brought before the Board. The inclusion of Student Trustees enables the perspective of students to be considered in the decisions of members of the Board, and provides students with valuable learning experiences.

Background:

This year, the student trustee election process went digital and provided an opportunity for every Grade 7-12 HWDSB student to participate in voting for their top 2 candidates to represent their voice at the boardroom table. Following students submitting an electronic ballot, the votes at each school were tallied and each school (with grades 7-12) submitted a final ballot with their schools top 2 choices that was used in determining who would be voted as Student Trustees for 2019-20.

Student Trustee Election candidates were invited to the Education Centre in early April to be filmed while answering three questions:

- What does Student Voice mean to you and how will you ensure it is captured through Student Senate and then brought forward to the Board of Trustees?
- The role of Student Trustee requires an individual with strong leadership skills. With our student
 population being multi-cultural, multi-ethnic, and multi-racial, how do you plan to lead members of
 the Student Senate AND represent the student body of the HWDSB?

HWDSB has 5 Strategic Directions, one of which is Positive Culture and Well-being. How will you as a Student Trustee support the positive culture and well-being strategic direction through both Student Senate and as a member of the Board of Trustees?

The video and a candidate bio were made available on the HWDSB website in order for students to review prior to casting their vote for Student Trustees.

A total of ten applications were received and all candidates moved on to the Election Assembly as they all met the eligibility criteria. Applications were received from Ancaster, Saltfleet, Sherwood, Sir John A. Macdonald, Westdale and Westmount (some schools had multiple applications submitted).

Following Board approval tonight, Ahona Mehdi and Cameron Prosic will be introduced and sworn in at Board meeting on May 27, 2019.

RE: Naming of the New Ancaster Senior/Fessenden School

Action X Monitoring \square

Recommended Action:

That the following three submissions by the School Naming Advisory Committee be considered for the new elementary school at the Ancaster Senior/Fessenden Site currently under construction and completion is expected in September 2019.

Recommended names (unranked and in alphabetical order)

- Evergreen
- Frank Panabaker
- Nakoma

Rationale/Benefits:

The School Naming Advisory Committee is putting forth the three listed names in no particular order. The submissions were reviewed according to the guiding principles outlined in the Board policy and procedure.

The School Naming Advisory Committee met on April 9, 2019 to discuss and consider the public consultation report and all names suggested. The Committee used several rounds of voting to come to consensus for the three recommendations to be considered by Trustees.

Background:

As part of the Ancaster Accommodation Review, the Board of Trustees approved the closure of Fessenden and Queen's Rangers, pending Ministry of Education funding for two new JK-8 elementary schools on the CH Bray and Rousseau sites, as well as an addition at Ancaster Senior.

In March of this year, HWDSB received Ministry of Education funding for a \$3,702,489 addition to Ancaster Senior. The addition is currently under construction and the intention is to have the addition complete for September 2019.

According to HWDSB's policy, the naming of school process will begin at the closure of two or more schools and consolidation into a new build on an existing or new site.

Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board (HWDSB) recognizes that naming schools, or sections of the school, provides a unique opportunity to further develop an identity for the school, its students, its community, its staff and the Board.

Names for schools chosen under this policy must consider the following guiding principles:

- reflect HWDSB's vision, mission, commitments and community composition
- provide inspiration to students
- have community and district acceptance
- be appropriate for the whole district
- have local community, district, provincial, Canadian or international significance
- where appropriate and possible, address underrepresented groups.

A name chosen for a school, or a section of the school, is expected to have community acceptance while being appropriate for the whole district.

HWDSB solicited suggestions for names of the new elementary school at the Ancaster Senior/Fessenden Site in Ancaster from stakeholder groups through the completion of an online survey, and/or by mailing or emailing written correspondence to HWDSB. The survey was posted from January 31 to March 22, 2019 and resulted in 97 submissions with over 99 suggested names.

The summary of consultation findings is attached. All names were considered.

The following names are presented, in alphabetical order, for consideration. The committee believes all names uphold the guiding principles.

Evergreen

Evergreen Avenue is the name of a street in Ancaster, Ontario. There is no history on why the name was selected, but typically names such as Evergreen are selected, because of the presence of evergreens in the vicinity. In the dictionary definition, an ever green is a plant that maintains green leaves through the entire year.

Frank Panabaker (1904 - 1992)

Frank Panabaker, an artist closely associated with Hamilton during his lengthy career, also enjoyed a considerable international reputation for his paintings of the Canadian landscape.

Frank Panabaker was a member of the Allied Artists of America, one of a handful of Canadians ever to be elected to the group, an associate member of the Royal Canadian Academy, and a member of the board of trustees for the National Gallery in Ottawa for six years.

His artistic career was launched one summer when the artist McGillivray Knowles arrived in town to teach a sketching class. Frank's father, impressed by his son's early interest and talent in drawing, suggested that the 16-year-old might like to join the class, rather than push heavy carts through the steaming woolen mill.

Born in Hespeler (now Cambridge), he made his home in the Hamilton area for most of his life. He attended the Ontario College of Art in Toronto and continued his studies at the Grand Central School of Art in New York.

Frank Panabaker had his first show at the Preston Springs Hotel in 1927. From that time, he was a fully self-supporting professional artist. With his wife Katherine's support and able assistance, more exhibitions followed across southern Ontario. Several wealthy sponsors provided a steady, albeit small income in exchange for paintings which carried the young couple through the difficult depression years.

Much of his subject matter was local scenes in and around Ancaster, the Dundas valley and marsh, and of course, Hamilton. From the royal yacht Brittania in Hamilton Harbour, to the Hamilton Farmers' Market, the Tiger Cats and Gore Park, Frank Panabaker documented the life and times of the Steel City from the 1940's to through to the 1990's.

He painted up until the last week of his life, dying in his 88th year in 1992. In 1996, Frank Panabaker was inducted into the Hamilton Gallery of Distinction.

Nakoma

Nakoma is the name of an Ancaster road and neighbourhood. It is a "mature" neighborhood in Ancaster. There is no indication why the neighborhood and road in Ancaster were named Nakoma, possibly a Native American connection. It is supposedly an Aboriginal word that could mean "I do as I promise" or "Great Warrior", but this hasn't been verified. Nakoma is also an architectural design by Frank Lloyd Wright created in 1923, "It was a building with a New World character of the American landscape as distinct and free of previous architectural conventions as was humanly possible". The design was purchased in 2001 and built at a Golf Course/Resort.

Consultation on the Naming of Schools March 27, 2019 Ancaster Senior and Fessenden Site Findings

Purpose of Consultation

Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board (HWDSB) asked the community to provide feedback on naming of the new school on the **Ancaster Senior and Fessenden** site. Respondents were asked to choose a name that:

- reflects HWDSB's vision, mission, commitments and community composition
- provides inspiration to students
- has community and district acceptance
- is appropriate for the whole district
- has local community, district, provincial, Canadian or international significance
- address under-represented groups

The feedback was requested through a survey which was posted online from January 31, 2019 to March 22, 2019. Some responses were received as a letter via regular mail.

Respondent Characteristics

A total of 97 responses were received for the Ancaster Senior and Fessenden site. The majority of responses came from parents/guardians (65%, n = 62). Other responses were from those who indicated "Other" (13%, n = 12), HWDSB staff (10%, n = 10), Community/group member (6%, n = 6) and HWDSB students (6%, n = 6). Of the respondents who said they have children at HWDSB, 60%, (n = 35) have two children, 28%, (n = 16) have one child, 7%, (n = 4) have four children, and 5%, (n = 3) have three children.

Limitation of the Consultation

Please note that the total number of responses should not be equated with the total number of unique respondents as it is possible that the same person may have submitted the survey multiple times.

Conclusion

42%, (n = 41) of respondents indicated they wanted the school name to be tied to the geographical area, to be representative of a historical figure and/or representative of someone with good values. The name *Ancaster* was the most frequent response followed by *Fessenden* with respondents saying they chose these names because of the geographical area. *Andrew H. Frame* was the third most frequent response with respondents saying they chose this name because this person is a historical figure who represents good values and was a person of significance to the respondents.

Rationale/Benefits:

The School Naming Advisory Committee is putting forth the three listed names in no particular order. The submissions were reviewed according to the guiding principles outlined in the Board policy and procedure.

The School Naming Advisory Committee met on April 2, 2019 to discuss and consider the public consultation report and all names suggested. The Committee used several rounds of voting to come to consensus for the three recommendations to be considered by Trustees.

Background:

On March 2015 and March 2018, HWDSB received total Ministry of Education funding of \$14.4 million for a 511-pupil place, K-8 elementary school on the Beverly Community Centre Site. Construction has started on this school and completion is expected in the 2019-20 school year.

According to HWDSB's policy, the naming of school process will begin at the closure of two or more schools and consolidation into a new build on an existing or new site.

Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board (HWDSB) recognizes that naming schools, or sections of the school, provides a unique opportunity to further develop an identity for the school, its students, its community, its staff and the Board.

Names for schools chosen under this policy must consider the following guiding principles:

- reflect HWDSB's vision, mission, commitments and community composition
- provide inspiration to students
- have community and district acceptance
- be appropriate for the whole district
- have local community, district, provincial, Canadian or international significance
- where appropriate and possible, address underrepresented groups.

A name chosen for a school, or a section of the school, is expected to have community acceptance while being appropriate for the whole district.

HWDSB solicited suggestions for names of the new elementary school at the Beverly Community Centre Site in Hamilton from stakeholder groups through the completion of an online survey, and/or by mailing or emailing written correspondence to HWDSB. The survey was posted from January 31 to March 22, 2019 and resulted in 97 submissions with over 56 suggested names.

Cecil Hamilton

Cecil Hamilton was born in Strabane where he has lived all his life and is the author of Strabane's History. He has a passion for volunteering, and is particularly active with Westfield Heritage Village and the Rockton Agricultural Society. Cecil Hamilton spent many years volunteering as the schoolmaster in the Westfield schoolhouse. In 2008, he was presented with the Ontario Heritage Trust Lifetime Achievement Award for "a lifetime of volunteer work to identify, preserve, protect and promote our province's rich heritage. Cecil Hamilton was a teacher for 35 years. He started a local one-room schoolhouse and became principal of Beverly Central School.

Chanie Wenjack (1954 - 1966)

Chanie Wenjack was an Anishinaabe boy sent to residential school 600 km from home. His attempt to run away from residential school resulted in his death from exposure and hunger, and led to increased public awareness of abusiveness of the residential school system.

Chanie Wenjack grew up at Ogoki Post on the Marten Falls Reserve. At age nine, he was sent to Cecilia Jeffrey Indian Residential School where he was given the name "Charlie". On 16 October 1966, Wenjack and two of his friends escaped from the Cecilia Jeffrey School—children ran away frequently from residential schoolsWenjack died 23 October 1966, one week after he escaped from Cecilia Jeffrey School. The coroner's inquest was held in November 1966 and the report found that "The Indian education system causes tremendous emotional and adjustment problems for these children." This prompted ethical and moral questioning of the culturally oppressive and abusive environments in the residential schools.

Chanie Wenjack has inspired several artistic tributes including Gord Downie's The Secret Path, a multimedia project that includes an album, graphic novel and animated film based on Wenjack's story. His story, as well as many other tragic stories of residential school students, led to eventual reforms and class action lawsuits, including the Indian Residential Schools Settlement Agreement and the Truth and Reconciliation Commission

Rockton

Rockton is a small community located 32 kilometers northwest of Hamilton. It has been the host of the famous Rockton World's fair since the mid-1850's. The title of "World's Fair" was first used by local newspapers in 1878. Rockton also draws visitors as a well-established community with ties that stretch as far back as the United Empire Loyalists. According to writing by Robert Kirkland Kernighan, a group of settlers decided on the name "Rocktown" which later was shortened to Rockton. The name likely derived from the rocks, stones and quarries in the area.



Purpose of Consultation

Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board (HWDSB) asked the community to provide feedback on naming of the new school on **Beverly Community Centre site**. Respondents were asked to choose a name that:

- reflects HWDSB's vision, mission, commitments and community composition
- provides inspiration to students
- has community and district acceptance
- is appropriate for the whole district
- has local community, district, provincial, Canadian or international significance
- address under-represented groups

The feedback was requested through a survey which was posted online from January 31, 2019 to March 22, 2019. Some responses were received as a letter via regular mail.

Respondent Characteristics


A total of 75 responses were received for the Beverly Community Centre site. The majority of these responses were from parents/guardians (54%, n = 40). Other responses were from those who indicated "Other" (19%, n = 14), HWDSB staff (14%, n = 10), Community/group members (9%, n = 7), and HWDSB students (4%, n = 3). Of the respondents who said they have children at HWDSB, 63% (n = 26) have two children, 17%, (n = 7) have one child, 17%, (n = 7) have three children, and 2% (n = 1) have four children.



Conclusion

55% (n = 41) of respondents indicated they wanted the school name to be tied to the geographical area, to be representative of someone with good values (41%, n = 31) and/or tied to someone of personal significance to the general community (37%, n = 28). The name *Beverly* was the most frequent response followed by *Rockton* with respondents saying they chose these names because of the geographical area. *Andrew H. Frame* was the third most frequent response with respondents saying they chose this name because this person is a historical figure who represented good values and is of significance to the general community.

Rationale/Benefits:

The School Naming Advisory Committee is putting forth the two listed names in no particular order. The submissions were reviewed according to the guiding principles outlined in the Board policy and procedure.

The School Naming Advisory Committee met on April 17, 2019 to discuss and consider the public consultation report and all names suggested. The Committee used several rounds of voting to come to consensus for the three recommendations to be considered by Trustees.

Background:

As part of the Ancaster Accommodation Review, the Board of Trustees approved the closure of Fessenden and Queen's Rangers, pending Ministry of Education funding for two new JK-8 elementary schools on the CH Bray and Rousseau sites, as well as an addition at Ancaster Senior.

In March of this year, HWDSB received Ministry of Education funding for a new \$12.25 million, 495 pupil place, K-8 elementary school on the current C.H. Bray site. The new school construction has received Site Plan Approval and the school has been tendered with the intention of starting construction in the summer of 2019. Construction of an elementary school usually takes 12-16 months.

According to HWDSB's policy, the naming of school process will begin at the closure of two or more schools and consolidation into a new build on an existing or new site.

Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board (HWDSB) recognizes that naming schools, or sections of the school, provides a unique opportunity to further develop an identity for the school, its students, its community, its staff and the Board.

Spring Valley

Ancaster's Spring Valley Neighbourhood is located between Jerseyville Road, Wilson Street, and Shaver Road.

The Spring Valley Community Association is a nonprofit organization that coordinates activities and provides financial support for the children, youth, seniors and families of the Spring Valley Community and the Town of Ancaster.

The Spring Valley Community Association was founded in 1948 by residents of the Spring Valley area and continues to operate as a volunteer association today. Veterans who settled on this land given to them by the Veterans Land Act in 1946, started the Spring Valley Association. The association built a community hall at the end of Orchard Drive, on the site now occupied by the Spring Valley Arena.

In July of 1966, Spring Valley Community Association donated the hall to the township. They sold it, plus 22 acres of land, to the Town of Ancaster for the sum of \$1.00 with the stipulation that the land would always be used for recreational purposes.

On September 3, 1969 the hall at the end of Orchard drive was destroyed by fire and the town built what is now known as Spring Valley Arena.

Wilson

Wilson Street in Ancaster runs east/west between Filman Road in West Hamilton and Garner Road in West Ancaster.

In 1791, James Wilson built a gristmill and sawmill south of the present corner of Wilson and Rousseaux streets. He later built a store, a tavern, a blacksmith shop and a distillery. This area was called Wilson Mills until 1795, when it was named the Village of Ancaster by Upper Canada's first lieutenant governor, John Graves Simcoe. The main street of the village was named after Wilson, who was one of the earliest settlers in the area.





A name chosen for a school, or a section of the school, is expected to have community acceptance while being appropriate for the whole district.

HWDSB solicited suggestions for names for the new elementary school at 110 Bellagio Avenue, Glanbrook from stakeholder groups through the completion of an online survey, and/or by mailing or emailing written correspondence to HWDSB. The survey was posted from January 31 to March 22, 2019 and resulted in 82 responses with over 40 suggested names.

The following names are presented, in alphabetical order, for consideration. The committee believes both names uphold the guiding principles.

Jay Keddy

HWDSB teacher, father of three, and avid cyclist was struck and killed while riding home from school on December 2, 2015. Mr. Keddy served as teacher with HWDSB at Central and Prince of Wales Schools. Being environmentally conscious, Jay utilized public transit and his bicycle to travel throughout the Hamilton area. Jay was a proud member of the Hamilton-Wentworth Elementary Teachers Local and served on various social justice committees. A faithful member of West Highland Baptist Church, Jay served his community both locally and globally.

Shannen Koostachin

Shannen Koostachin of Attawapiskat First Nation advocated to raise awareness about the state of aboriginal education in remote communities such as Attawapiskat. She promoted "safe and comfy" schools and culturally based education for First Nations children. Shannen and the children of Attawapiskat launched the Attawapiskat School Campaign to reach out to non-Aboriginal children all across Canada and write the federal government and demand a new school for Attawapiskat. In May of 2010, Shannen Koostachen passed away in an automobile accident.

Purpose of Consultation

Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board (HWDSB) asked the community to provide feedback on naming of the new school on the **Summit Park** site. Respondents were asked to choose a name that:

- reflects HWDSB's vision, mission, commitments and community composition
- provides inspiration to students
- has community and district acceptance
- is appropriate for the whole district
- has local community, district, provincial, Canadian or international significance
- address under-represented groups

The feedback was requested through a survey which was posted online from January 31, 2019 to March 22, 2019. Some responses were received as a letter via regular mail.

Respondent Characteristics


A total of 82 responses were received for the Summit Park site. The majority of responses came from parents/guardians (54%, n = 44). Other responses received were from those who indicated they were HWDSB staff HWDSB staff (20%, n = 16), "Other" (11%, n = 9), HWDSB students (10%, n = 8) and Community group/member (5%, n = 4). Of the respondents who said they have children at HWDSB, 45%, (n = 17) have one child, 34% (n = 13) have two children, 13% (n = 5) have three children and 5% (n = 2) have four children.

Limitation of the Consultation

Please note that the total number of responses should not be equated with the total number of unique respondents as it is possible that the same person may have submitted the survey multiple times.

Conclusion

48%, (n = 39) of respondents indicated they wanted the school name to be tied to the geographical areas, was representative of a person with good values (45%, n = 37) and was a historical figure (43%, n = 35). The name *Summit* was the most frequent response followed by *Andrew H. Frame* with respondents saying they chose the name because of it was tied to the geographical areas and the name represents a historical figure. *Gord Downie* was the third most frequent response with respondents saying they chose this name because this person is a historical figure who represents good values.
