1. Call to Order

Alex Johnstone, Chair of the Board, called the meeting to order at 6:05 p.m.

The Chair welcomed a number of Community Partners, the media and the public to the Board meeting.

4. Confirmation of the Minutes – September 30, 2019

The minutes of September 30, 2019 were confirmed.

Reports from Staff:

5. Safe Schools Review

The Chair spoke of the devastation that took place at Sir Winston Churchill Secondary School three weeks ago. She shared that the concerns of students, parents, teachers and the community were heard. The Board of Trustees want to work with all concerned parties to make schools and communities safer for everyone. Chair Johnstone shared that bullying is a complex issue throughout communities. She indicated that the solution is more complex and often starts in our schools however, this goes beyond the walls of our schools and so does the solution. Gratitude was extended to HWDSB Community Partners for collaborating with the Board to find solutions not just in Hamilton but across the province.

Director Figueiredo noted there has been a heightened concern regarding the issue of bullying across the broader community prompted by the tragic incident earlier this month at Sir Winston Churchill Secondary School. HWDSB staff continues to collaborate with the ongoing criminal investigation by Hamilton Police Services. The Panel's role is to coordinate, facilitate, and gather input and feedback from community groups about the broader concern of bullying in HWDSB and our community. The panel's role is not to investigate the specific incident at Sir Winston Churchill Secondary School as that will be completed by a third party once the criminal investigation is completed.

Staff highlighted the framework in the report including an establishment of a Bullying Prevention & Intervention Review Panel, the scope of the review, the stakeholder input and feedback to the panel, the methodology and the timelines for the Safe School Review Panel. Trustees were each given an opportunity to speak and ask questions.

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<u>RESOLUTION #19-123:</u> Trustee Ray Mulholland, seconded by Trustee Danko, moved: **That a Bullying**Prevention & Intervention Review Panel be created with a focus on bullying prevention, intervention, reporting, and responding in order to provide independent feedback and recommendations to the Director of Education and shared with the Board no later than May 31, 2020.

14. Oral Reports from Liaison Committees:

A. City/School Board Liaison Committee

Trustee Johnstone shared that the City/School Board Liaison Committee met on October 10, 2019 and two options were presented in a report to Counsellors and Trustees. These options were to offer the City a long term payment plan, similar to a line or credit or mortgage which would allow a greater opportunity for the City to purchase Board properties. Option one offered the City to pay an agreed upon amount annually, whether they had purchased land or not and option two offered a longer term payment plan once the property was purchased. Option two was the preferred option and staff are to report back on that option and how that could be implemented. Trustee Galindo shared that there was also discussion that City Councillors receive funds to make changes locally within their ward on Board property and felt that could be filtered through the City/Board Liaison Committee as well. Staff will report back.

B. Hamilton-Wentworth Home and School Association

Trustee Danko shared that the Hamilton-Wentworth Home and School Association met on October 10, 2019. Norwood Park was welcomed as a new member of the Association. The Hamilton-Wentworth Home and School Association received a Parent Reaching out Grant that they used to host an event that Director Figueiredo, Associate Director Zucker and Trustee Danko attended. The Committee discussed having appropriate by-laws in place and are looking at updating their current by-laws. They are also looking to the Board to clarify the community use of schools and where their association fits into community use of schools. They are also looking to update their information on the Board web site as well as the school web sites.

C. Hamilton Foundation for Student Success (HWDSB Foundation)

Trustee Paikin Miller shared that the Donor Appreciation Event originally planned for Thursday, October 10, 2019 was rescheduled for Thursday, November 21, 2019 due to the recent job action. The heARTS Wide Open Gala will take place on Thursday, December 5, 2019 at Michelangelo's Banquet Centre. The evening will be a celebration and showcase of the exceptional artistic talent of HWDSB students. Early Bird tickets are on sale until November 1, 2019.

D. Ontario Public School Boards' Association (OPSBA)

Trustee Johnstone stated that OPSBA has not met since she last reported noting that the Legislative Assembly resumed on October 28, 2019 and will meet again on November 12, 2019. She highlighted the federal election that took place on October 21, 2019. The regional OPSBA meeting will be held in London on November 2, 2019.

15. Oral Reports from Liaison Committees:

A. Student Trustees' Report

Student Trustees Prosic and Mehdi shared the following highlights:

- The first student senate meeting held on October 23, 2019 was well attended.
- The OSTA/AECO Fall General Meeting held October 17–19, 2019 provided professional development opportunities for those in attendance and sitting on the Board.
- Currently plans are underway for the Board Council Conference taking place in February 2020.
- OSTA has released a few press statements e.g. proposed class sizes and e-learning report.
- OSTA/AECO are on Twitter and they now have an Instagram account

B. Director's Report

The Director shared the following highlights:

- Under the Safe Schools requirements under the Ministry of Education Boards must report violent incidents. The Ministry has a clear definition of the criteria of violence e.g. possessing a weapon, firearm, sexual assault, robbery, etc. The Ministry pulls the report from ONSIS from each Board's ONSIS. CBC requested a copy of the incidents and HWDSB is working with our Privacy Officer to ensure that no personal data is shared. There was an error in the ONSIS reporting which is currently being addressed and updated to ensure that both the Board's ONSIS and the Ministry ONSIS are aligned.
- Thanks were given for the hard work of staff for My Path, My Way. It was a great success and continues to grow each year.

C. Chair's Report

The Chair shared that Trustees continue to be in schools and attend community events.

The committee held a meeting from 5:31 p.m. to 7:47 p.m. on October 22 2019 at 20 Education Court, Hamilton, ON, in Meeting Room 340D with Trustee Penny Deathe presiding.

Members present were: Trustee Penny Deathe (Chair), Kathy Archer, and Cam Galindo. Regrets: Dawn Danko and Becky Buck

MONITORING ITEMS:

A. Student Learning and Achievement Report

Staff presented the report which included:

- A review of the 2018-19 implementation of the HWDSB Annual Plan for Student Learning and Achievement and the current implementation of the 2019-20 HWDSB Annual Plan
- Appendix A: Student Learning and Achievement Data
- Appendix B: Additional Data Sets

Staff highlighted Celebrations, Opportunities, and Learning as the result of reflection on the 2018-19 Annual Plan and Student Achievement Data including:

- Celebrations regarding: the improvement of the percentage of Grade I students achieving a B- or above in reading on their June report card; improving and narrowing the gap between HWDSB and the Province in Grades 3, 6 and 9 EQAO Math; and, for the fourth year, maintaining the graduation rate above 80%.
- Opportunities to: reach the goal of 75% of Grade I Students achieving at least a B- in reading on the June 2020 report
 card; reach the target to narrow the gap between HWDSB and the Province for Grade 6 students performing at or above
 the provincial standard on the Junior EQAO Assessment by June 2020; and, reach the target of at least 83% of students
 graduating within 5 years by August 2020.
- Learning included: focusing Reading Specialists in Grade I paired with consistent monitoring improved reading
 achievement; focus on knowing learners and responding accordingly improves achievement in math; and, focusing on
 supporting students in pathway selection and engagement in Specialist High Skills Majors and other programs increased
 Student Success.

Staff outlined the three goals for 2019-20 remain;

- 1. All students reading, with a target of at least 75% of Grade I students achieving a B- or above in their June report card
- 2. Improvement in Mathematics with a target to further narrow the gap between HWDSB and the province for students performing at or above the provincial standard by June 2020.
- 3. All students graduating, with a target of at least 83% graduating within 5 years by August 2020

The strategies to achieve these goals for 2019-20 include: investing in people, leveraging effective practice and refining measures of progress while monitoring progress.

The High Priority School Strategy in 2019-20 builds on the work of 2018-19 and includes a full time Reading Specialist being placed in all but one High Priority School to support both students and staff. Early Childhood Educators and the Elementary Student Success Team continue to support these schools. Also, the ongoing partnership with Public Health continues in 2019-20.

The Program Committee received the Student Learning and Achievement Report.

B. Grade One French Immersion Application Process Update

Staff provided an overview of the Grade I French Immersion Process for 2019-20 and feedback from the French as a Second Language Advisory Committee with regards to the sibling provision and timelines involved in the process.

The 2019-20 application process will involve four stages:

- 1. An Awareness Stage that will run from October 1st to December 1st and is intended to make parents/guardians and the wider community aware of the process an timelines;
- 2. An Application Stage which runs from December 2, 2019 to January 20, 2020 and allows for the on-line application for Senior Kindergarten students;
- 3. The Placement Stage which incorporates the allocation of classrooms based on school accommodation capacity and runs a random selection process;
- 4. The Consolidation Stage from March 23 2020 to June 26 2020 allows for a continuous intake of applications and monthly offers of placements.

Feedback from the French as a Second Language Advisory Committee (FASLAC) around timelines and the sibling provision was provided with the suggestions that application timelines open prior to December Ist to allow for a longer period of time for families, as well as ensuring parents are made aware that the process is not based on first-come, first-served. The FASLAC also inquired as to whether the Board could consider creating more French Immersion spaces and school locations in an effort to ensure families were placed in their home school. Staff noted that this is not possible at this time.

C. Summer Learning program 2018-19 Report

Staff presented the 2018-19 Report for the Summer Learning Program, Camp Power, providing the following highlights:

- 15 day, full day program engaging 210 invited kindergarten and Grade I students from High Priority Schools;
- Supported at 2 locations by 6 EAs, 13 teachers, 2 Speech pathologists, 2 site leads and Administration;
- 10 students from Grades 6-12 participated through new youth program in building leadership skills as volunteers;
- Community partnerships involving the Hamilton Bulldogs Foundation and Indigenous educators and Knowledge Keepers;
- Parent engagement through Social media and Friday participation.
