#### Participate in the Student Dress Guidelines Consultation

Student Dress Guidelines are important in providing a safe, equitable, welcoming and inclusive environment for everyone. Students have a right to express themselves, which is important to their mental health and well-being.

On October 18th 2022, HWDSB Trustees passed a motion to develop Student Dress Guidelines at the system level, meaning that individual schools will no longer have their own dress codes. 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## *Explore school-community connections to remove barriers, making it more accessible for students and families to access community services and support.*

- Needs Assessment and Partnership Evaluation Survey
  - Strategy to understand the school-based needs related to community support, as well as to evaluate community programming in relation to meeting these needs
  - 97 schools completed the Needs Assessment November December 2023
  - 41 responses to date submitted for the Partnership Evaluation Survey
- Coffee in the Community
  - As part of the Engagement Strategy, community-based onboarding and transitions has been identified as an area for advancement
  - 4 community tours organized with Director of Education
- Hamilton Public Library
  - Working group (Community Engagement, Program, IIT, Privacy) exploring a barrier-free process to distribute library cards to HWDSB students, connecting youth and their families to a wide range of collections, resources, spaces, and supports


