Terry Fox's story teaches your child courage, empathy

Terry Fox made history when he began his Marathon of Hope in 1980. He planned to run across Canada to raise money and awareness for cancer research and he was doing it with one artificial leg. Fox lost his leg to cancer and used his story to inspire others. Terry Fox made it more than 5,000 km across the east coast, Quebec and Ontario before the cancer spread to his lungs, preventing him from continuing. On June 28, 1981 Terry Fox died at the age of 22.

On Sept. 13, 1981, the first Terry Fox Run took place at 760 sites across Canada with approximately 300,000 people participating. The first run raised \$3.5 million. To date, the Terry Fox run has raised more than \$400 million for cancer research. Thank you to Ms. Dichazi and the staff for organizing a successful Terry Fox run on September 27^{th} . We raised over \$2000! In the past 36 years Yorkview has raised a total of \$64 299.70 for cancer research. Way to go Yorkview!

EQAO preliminary results

The preliminary results from the grade three testing from last Spring have been released. Parents have received their child's individual results. We are pleased with our results as they have remained stable (keeping in mind a difference of one or two students can translate to a difference of 10% in the scores).

Here is a brief synopsis of the school's results for all Grade 3 students at or above provincial standard (levels 3 & 4):

Reading 74%

Writing 74%

Math 65%

The testing results provide a "snapshot" of student progress and staff will analyze all the data to address student needs and program delivery.
